



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
Acknowledgements

Principal's report

This year we have celebrated the many and varied achievements of the students of Taupo-nui-a-Tia College. Some students have started to develop their potential and are excelling in their particular field be it the arts, sport or academic pursuits. Others might not realise the potential they have and will have a number of false starts before they find their calling.

At Senior Prizegiving we had two performing artists as guest speakers (Awhimai Fraser and James Tito). I will use Alan Rickman's journey to becoming a famous actor as an example of this. He did an Arts degree because he was told that drama school wasn't necessarily the sensible thing to do at 18. That led him to be a graphic designer. Rickman and other



In order to achieve the qualities listed we have to change the way the learning occurs in the school. Students need to be given opportunities to work collaboratively with a diverse range of people in different contexts. They need the opportunity to be enterprising, creative and curious and just as importantly they need the experience of learning through failure. Next year we move to 90-minute periods. This is an interim step before we move to cross-curricular courses for year 9 students in 2020. The feedback we have received from a range of other schools is that the extended period allows students and teachers the opportunity to explore topics and concepts in more breadth and depth. As one

friends opened a graphic design studio. However, the call of acting is really strong, so he decided to drop the business and pursue acting professionally.

He supported himself by working as a dresser for other actors. He got his acting break when he was cast as one of the leads in the stage version of Les Liaisons Dangereuse. The play was a hit and made the leap to the big screen. Unfortunately, he was replaced by another actor, but he did get recognised by a producer on Bruce Willis' Die Hard movie. As a result, he got a lead role playing a German terrorist leader. This resulted in a whole series of movies and his passion and perseverance for acting served him well through the various roles he played. He was 42 years old when he took on the role of Professor Severus Snape of the Harry Potter series.

The learning from this story is it takes a lot of courage and resilience to pursue what your heart really desires. You have to give up security, convenience and even luxury at some point. You may be afraid of the possible outcome now, but don't let yourself regret in the future as to why you didn't try.

Some of the attributes outlined in Alan Rickman's story are included in the Taupo-nui-a-Tia College Graduate profile developed this year. As our student's leave this college to an uncertain future we have recognised the need for them to be resilient, motivated, confident and critical thinkers. We also want them to have a sound set of values and be confident about their identity and culture. teacher from a Thames Valley School, who was an initial sceptic of the idea said and I quote;

"Firstly, I know you are considering 90-minute periods and I can say that moving to 100-minute periods has been one of the best decisions our school has made. Overwhelmingly our staff and students are in support of 100-minute periods"

She continues by saying:

"My seniors LOVE the longer periods. We can get stuck into research, close reading etc and actually make significant progress with our assessments"

To complement the proposed changes to the curriculum we hope to have a new set of classrooms with flexible learning spaces that will enable team teaching and cross curricular collaboration

This year I took on the Lead Principal position for the Taupo Kahui Ako. This is a challenging role, but I strongly believe in the value of all the schools, local iwi and early child centres working together for the benefit of the young people in this community. This community is fortunate to have the goodwill of schools in the district along with some highly experienced Across School Leaders facilitating the Kahui Ako initiatives. Evidence indicates that this year's focus on writing has had a positive impact across the community. There is also considerable energy going into learning support, Maori achievement and ensuring seamless transitions between each phase of a child's educational

pathway. The more work this community puts into identifying and addressing the learning needs of our young people as early as possible the more the Taupo Community will benefit.

Sadly, we have a long serving staff member leave us this year. **Liz Davis** leaves to go into the business world after 23 years at Taupo-nui-a-Tia College. Liz started here teaching Life Skills but developed into a very good teacher of Mathematics. She has also been the Principal's nominee and been the interface between the college and the New Zealand Qualification Authority.

I have appreciated Liz's support and guidance over many years along with her wicked sense of humour. Liz will certainly tell you in no uncertain terms when you get it wrong but her motivation for doing so is always with the school's best interest at heart.

Eden Pirie leaves to pursue more study and possible involvement in another area of education as does Liz Ward. Cal Jackson leaves to travel, and Sarah Groome leaves to join her husband in Opotiki. Sarah McNeil leaves us for a teaching position in Thailand. To all of those staff – thank you for your contribution to the life of the school and all the best for the future. This school continues to produce graduates that achieve outstanding success in a broad spectrum of pursuits and it is always a pleasure to follow their progress and successes in the myriad of different pathways they take – this includes academia, sport, drama, politics, business or a chosen profession.

I would like to think that Taupo-nui-a-Tia College has played a part in preparing our young people for their future and at the very heart of this is our dedicated and hardworking staff. When you have our Year 13 Dean getting tearful about saying goodbye to her Year group after five years you know you have a staff that genuinely care about their students.

Though their bodies may have passed, their roles within history shall never be forgotten.



This is the second year Taupo-nui-a-Tia College has been involved in the Leadership through Peer Mediation programme with the Peace Foundation.

The team of trained mediators are a credit to the College and the Peace Foundation who provide superb training. The team are skilled and motivated to share their skills to support students in the College but were noticing referrals for the mediation service was slow.

As a part of the College Wellbeing focus it was decided students needed to be actively and readily accessible to other students who wanted to chat.

These students needed to have skills and confidence to talk with other students in a supportive manner yet know clearly their own boundaries regarding safe conversations and when to ask for help. It was clear the trained peer mediators already had skills in this area and they have volunteered their time during lunchtimes on a 'duty' roster to be available in the quad for any students wanting to chat face to face. Their daily presence promotes the College's Cornerstone Values importantly respect, consideration and concern for others and kindness. They also promote fairness and watch out for harassment and bullying - creating a safe inclusive culture and helping students get the help they need.

Our mediators together with other school leaders also participated in training offered by a local family service to support and further develop their skills for these important conversations with young people who could be experiencing significant distress.

The 'hope ambassadors' understand the importance of a listening ear, asking the 'are you ok' question and supporting young people to ask for help and get the help available.

Year 13 Biology Trip

Sydney, Australia - 26th September to 2nd October

Another early morning start with a walk to Darling Harbour to the Aquarium. Sadly this was so overcrowded that it was difficult to complete the learning activities. The dugong, sharks, stingrays and penguins were entertaining, and the message of conservation and sustainability was reinforced again. The afternoon was spent exploring the many shops of Darling Harbour; Miss Simpson and Mrs



Brown continued their learning with a visit to the maritime museum and the National Geographic Photography display. A planned early night was disrupted with a fire alarm at the hostel, the NUI students all evacuated the building and




"Stop this now. There are armed forces positioned outside this Citadel." Hoping they had stuck to the plan.


