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Nau mai, haere mai ki Taupo-nui-a-Tia

I would like to extend a warm welcome to all members of the Taupo-nui-a-Tia College community for the start of the new year. A very special welcome is extended to those students and their parents who are new to the school this year. I hope your association with the college is a very positive one.

The annual colours day was held recently, and was an outstanding success. Much of the credit for the level of involvement and positive house spirit must go to our house leaders and senior students. They worked hard prior to the day teaching their chant to members of their house, organising themes and preparing banners and costumes. Colours day is always a great event and I enjoy watching the positive interaction between the seniors and juniors.

At a recent assembly I talked to students about the importance of good routines. Examples cited included getting to school on time every day. This routine was closely linked to going to bed at a reasonable time to ensure at least 8 hours sleep. Another routine mentioned was the need to wear the correct uniform to school, at school and going home from school. This ensured interactions with staff were positive and not a potentially negative conversation about uniform. Possibly the most important routine mentioned was attendance.

Students were given data relating to attendance that included;

Taupo-nui-a-Tia College

"Gatewav to Your Future"

- A student missing one day a week every week will enter secondary school a year and a half behind.
- The level of engagement in a child's first year of school is a predictor of life's outcomes in their twenties.
- Students who are absent even 5-10% of the time (still regular attendance) have substantially worse NCEA outcomes.
- Unjustified attendances are a strong predictor of lower attainment.
- Even between two students with the same Year 10 attendance, higher Year 7, 8 and 9 attendance predict higher NCEA attainment.
- Not all truants go to prison, but all prisoners were truants.

I would ask for your ongoing support in helping our students establish good routines to ensure successful outcomes at school and in later life – particularly in the workforce.

Thank you for the feedback we received regarding the first year of online uniform orders. We appreciate there were some concerns raised and so arranged a meeting with the suppliers Argyle. The data they provided was comprehensive and gave them a good insight into making improvements for next year.

Of all those surveyed 48% were happy with the service provided, 22% didn't mind either way and 30% were unhappy. Areas that Argyle identified as needing improvement for next year were the boy's shorts which were sized wrong as were the polar fleeces.

It was a pleasure to meet so many parents new to the college at the barbeque last week. Staff really value the opportunity to meet with you and start a dialogue that I hope will continue for the next five years.

Taupo-nui-a-Tia College's provisional NCEA results are pleasing and likely to rise even further with late results still to be entered. A Ministry of Education statistician visited last week to provide us with feedback about this college's results compared with national levels. She said we have bucked a trend with our NCEA Level 1 and 2 results - nationwide these results have dipped between 6-8% while Taupo-nui-a-Tia College results have risen slightly. Of particular note were the NCEA Level 3 results that have had a significant increase compared to last year. I would like to publicly thank our teaching staff for the time and effort they put in to ensure our students achieve the desired results. I know there is always room for improvement, and we will continue to strive to have students reach their potential.

The Taupo Community of Learning is holding an Education Summit for Early Childhood, Primary and Secondary Schools in the community on Friday May 15th. The evening prior to that date is an opportunity for parents and members of the community to come and listen to some leading educators talk about the future trends in education and what this means for your children. Further information is to follow but I would ask you to pencil in this date to attend these informative and entertaining presentations.

Messages from the Office

STUDENTS FEELING UNWELL

All students that are unwell or require first aid <u>must</u> report to the BayTrust. The nurse or Fiona will contact home if required.

To keep your child safe, they should follow this procedure.

The students **should not** be texting home directly or leaving school grounds without signing out.

ATTENDANCE

All students are required to attend each day when the College is open. If students are to be away from school for short periods of leave or holiday, permission must be obtained by written application to the Principal at least two weeks prior.

Notification of daily absences can be made by telephoning the school on 376 1100 then press 1 to leave an absence message or emailed to: <u>absent@taupocollege.ac.nz</u>

If a student arrives late to school, a note or phone call from home is required. Students must sign in at the office. Should students need to leave the school during school hours, they must have written permission from home which will be checked by a Dean.

Any person/s who are not listed on a students file will not have access to information and/or pick up that student without prior permission from a caregiver or by arrangement.

SCHOOL FEES

Statements are posted or emailed twice a term. Recommended course contributions are for take home components and requirements for subjects your child is studying. Any field trips away from school (which include sporting trips) must be paid for once the permission slip is returned and before your child goes on the trip.

Caregivers are encouraged to set up regular automatic payments. As little as \$5.00 per week can reduce your child's account by \$260 a year. Please give this some thought. An AP form is available from the school office or email <u>Debbie-lee.lidderd@taupocollege.ac.nz</u>.

It is recommended that students bring a note from home if credit on a student account needs to be accessed.

A reminder that students should not be wearing black jackets; these are only permitted in Term 2 and 3.

Taupo-nui-a-Tia College – UNIFORM SHOES

These leather shoes are permitted at school:



Uniform

All students are expected to wear their uniforms correctly. Please read the following guidelines:

No piece of uniform is to be defaced with writing. Students who wear their skirts/shorts incorrectly or have writing on their uniform may be required to purchase new uniform items.

→ SKIRTS

Skirts are to be worn on the waist – the top of the skirt is not to be rolled. The bottom of the skirt is to be no more than 10cm off the ground when a student is kneeling. A good guide is the width of the student's hand – the skirt hem is not to sit higher than hand width. The back of the skirt is to fall freely, it is not to hug the bottom, and the side pocket zip should open with ease.

\rightarrow Shorts

The legs on shorts are not to be rolled.

\rightarrow JACKETS/COATS

During terms 2 and 3 only, a plain black weather proof, puffer or rain jacket is permissible as an additional layer to the polar fleece or woolen jersey, not instead of school uniform. It should not have stripes, markings, emblems or logos. The jacket cannot be worn in class.

→ JEWELLERY

Students can wear a watch, plain studs and ONE other piece of jewellery. Stretcher earrings and ear rings with spikes at the back are NOT allowed. Facial piercings are also not allowed.

→ PE UNIFORM

All students in Years 9 and 10 who are taking PE are required to wear the Taupo-nui-a-Tia College green PE top and plain black shorts to all practical classes. This will allow your child to gain the most out of these subjects and also decrease the wear and tear of their own clothes. If they are not able to bring their PE uniform for some reason they need to provide a note from a parent/caregiver explaining why. The PE uniform is available for purchase at the school office.

HAIR/GROOMING

Students are expected to be well groomed and clean shaven. Extremes of fashion are not acceptable. Hair must be of a natural colour. Hair ties must be plain black, white, brown, red or green.

Make-up and coloured nail polish is not allowed; only clear nail polish is permitted.

Please contact your child's Whanau Teacher or Deputy Principal, Alistair Froggett, if you require clarification regarding uniform expectations.

Thank you to all parents and caregivers who ensure their child comes to school in correct uniform each day, and to students who choose to wear their uniform with pride.

Road Safety Reminder



- When transporting your child to and from school please use the drop off zone that is accessed through Gate 1. This reduces congestion and possible road hazards on Spa Road.

Information for learners, parents and whānau

Information about COVID-19 (novel coronavirus) for learners, caregivers and whānau

<u>Advice for an unwell child</u> - Anyone who is unwell should not be at school. If you have a particular concern about your child, please contact Healthline at 0800 358 5453 or your GP for medical advice. Healthline has translators and interpreters available 24/7 in 150 languages including Mandarin and Cantonese. The incubation period (the length of time it takes to start showing symptoms after being exposed to the virus) is up to 14 days.

<u>Length of stay at home period</u> - For child who may be at high risk of exposure because they have travelled recently to China or Iran, or have been in close contact with someone confirmed with the virus, we ask you to delay the start of their school year for 14 days or delay attending their early learning service and stay home.

<u>Authority to prevent a student's attendance</u> - If your child attends school or an early learning service while showing symptoms, they may be asked to return home by the Principal of a state school, an early learning service provider or home-based educator. <u>Keeping you and your family well</u> - In terms of keeping yourself and your family well, the Ministry of Health suggests the following:

- regularly washing hands (for at least 20 seconds with warm water and soap and dry thoroughly)
- covering your mouth and nose when you sneeze
- staying home if you are sick
- avoiding close contact with anyone with cold or flu-like symptoms
- if you feel unwell you should avoid public gatherings and events.

<u>Travel to and from China</u> -As of 2 February 2020, all travellers arriving in New Zealand out of mainland China should stay away from school for a period of 14 days from the time they leave mainland China. People who departed from mainland China before midnight 2 February are not required to stay away unless they have been in Wuhan City or Hubei Province in the last 14 days. If someone has been in close contact with a confirmed COVID-19 (novel coronavirus) case they should stay home for 14 days. If you develop symptoms including fever, coughing and difficulty breathing you should ring Healthline (for free) at any time on 0800 358 5453 - alternatively you can call your doctor. Healthline has translators and interpreters available 24/7 in 150 languages including Mandarin and Cantonese. o to the Ministry Foreign Affairs and Trade (MFAT) SafeTravel website for the latest advice on travel.
