

The Government's Tomorrow's Schools plan has been described as the biggest shake-up to the governance of education in New Zealand since the original Tomorrow's School's reforms of the Lange Government in 1989. In terms of the effects on this community the following changes are proposed:

Zoning – Currently enrolment schemes - commonly known as zones are established when there is a threat of overcrowding. The enrolment scheme boundaries defined by school boards and signed off by the Ministry of Education.

The recommendation is that boards lose all power to set zones and existing zones be reviewed by a new local or regional body, with out of zone enrolments "monitored and actively managed" by this body. This school is zoned. and I will interested to see what changes if any will be proposed.

Board of Trustees – boards will lose responsibility for school property and get extra support for financial services. There will also be the possibility of mandatory training for board members. The government is also interested in a "mandatory code of conduct" for boards.

Disputes/Suspension

The taskforce recommended that an independent panel be set up to handle these disputes free of charge. The panel would be empowered to order an apology, refer parents to mediation, and uphold or overturn decision of the board. They would be overseen by a "chief referee" appointed by the minister.

Equality – The government in the process of scrapping the "decile" system and replacing it with an "equity index" that aims to better target extra funding for schools with poorer students.

Although this sounds like a complicated system to introduce it could well bring in extra funding for this school.

Not mentioned in the recommendations from the task force that were signaled earlier in the Tomorrow's School's review were the introduction of Education Hub to replace boards, scrapping ERO and have then integrated into the Education Hub and the removal of Intermediate Schools.

Senior students are busy with NCEA external examinations and/or finishing off projects and assignments. This year we introduced an exit pass scheme where NCEA students were only able to leave school after prizegiving if they had fulfilled all their academic commitments. This has worked well thanks to the willingness and professionalism of our staff and the support of parents.

Planning is underway for a cross-curricular line in the Year 9 timetable next year. This is an exciting new opportunity for these students to experience a range of new courses that link to 'real world' topics.

This is the last newsletter for the year, and I would like to thank our parent community for the fantastic support you have given us throughout the year. This support has taken many forms ranging from extra-curricular activities such as sport, drama and music through to ensuring your child is in the correct uniform, on time and ready to learn every day. 
