As term three comes to an end I must confess that it has been a very demanding time working different under Alert Levels. Thankfully, we have managed to fit in some semblance of a sports season for our students, including tournaments. Likewise, cultural activities and competitions have taken place, albeit some online. Longer term plans are in place to be able to monitor every student needing extra support with their learning from early childhood through to secondary school. My role as the Lead Principal of the Taupo Kahui Ako ends in December of this year with the replacement to start in 2021.

We look forward to seeing as many of you as possible at "Meet the Teachers" next week. Bookings can be made online. I am guessing that the country will still be at Alert Level 2 so appropriate protocols will be in place including physical distancing, trace and tracking.

Snack, Crackle, Pop

Grab a beaker, pick up your whisk, and get ready to cook up some solid science.

Using food as our tool we have explored some incredible, yet edible science. When all the mad science was complete - we took a bite!

Throughout this course we explored the concepts of spherification, gelification, fermentation, foam, effervescence, caramelisation and crystallization.




Flying The Flag

Competitors from over 100 countries will be visiting Taupo for the Ironman World champs at the start of 2022.

The challenge provided by the Taupo Council for our students is to have every country's flag or cultural identity on display or represented somehow to help motivate the competitors to the finish line and make the event memorable.





During this course students used the design process to develop an idea that they thought could enhance the iron man experience for the competitors, supporters or volunteers. Students had the option to work on their own or in small groups. After they had a workable plan produced the next stage was to use their practical skills to create a prototype or model of their idea. These ideas were then presented to council and iron man representatives. It would be fair to say that an interesting range of ideas were developed, including underwater signs to offer words of encouragement

to the competitors. Plenty of creative skills were developed. Here hoping we see some of these great ideas when the World championships 70.3 Ironman finally comes to town.







Year 9 Cross Curricular

Wannabe Spelunker

A cross of outdoor education and social studies, this course looked at natural caves in New Zealand. Students were taken through a variety of team building activities with an Outdoor Education spin on it which included ABL and rock climbing.

The pinnacle of the course was the trip to Waitomo caves where the groups got to experience the "real thing", utilising one of New Zealand's most popular tourist attractions.

There was a vast amount of growth in knowledge and skills through this course and students have gained a solid understanding of application of Outdoor Education and Social Science at the college.



The Greatest Wealth Is Health

With well-being becoming a hot topic globally, students were given the task of creating a board game that incorporated the idea of well-being and the Maori perspective of Hauora.

Students were given the opportunity to investigate their own ideas for these games and had use of a wide range of technologies and skills ranging from painting, right through to milling machines, 3D printers and computer design.

The teachers were amazed at the creativity and innovation on this course and noted a huge amount of growth in self-management of the students on this course.

Downtime

During Down Time, students went out into the community to volunteer and work towards the Five Ways to Wellbeing. They were able to meet new people, learn new skills, and to help where they could. All hours spent volunteering were logged with the Student Volunteer Army and contributed towards their year 9 achievers award. This was a high trust course where students were given agency over where they choose to complete their placement. The feedback was that they appreciated the trust and respect given to them to do the right thing


