Term 1 has proved to be another very busy term and I know that both our students and staff are looking forward to a break. As well as a full academic programme a wide range of extracurricular activities have been in full swing. This includes Kapa haka practices, summer and winter sports, Zenith club and the Sheila Winn Shakespeare competition are just a few of the activities on offer at the college. Pleasingly, the Duke of Edinburgh's Hillary Award scheme is operating in the college again after a hiatus of over a year.

Unfortunately, brain teenage specialist Nathan Wallis had to postpone his evening presentation to parents and teachers last week due to delays with his flights. However, he has rescheduled his visit and will be here on Monday May 3 at Hilltop Primary at 7.30am. I would thoroughly recommend you attend his presentation. Nathan will give you a good understanding of why adolescents act the way they do - both the highs and the lows! He is an entertaining speaker who will provide you with some useful strategies when dealing with your child. Wallis says parenting was a great leveller because everyone was in the same boat. He said:

"He said the teenage years were the most creative times of a person's life - few of the world's great feats were achieved after the age of 25.

"That same brain that makes you a risk taker and more prone to anxiety, depression and suicide also makes you more creative and innovative and more likely to invent something."

During adolescence, teenagers' function with 10 per cent of a mature 'thinking' brain - the frontal cortex - and 90 per cent the 'feeling' brain they had as 4year-olds, while the frontal cortex is developing.

In adults, the ratio is reversed -90 per cent 'thinking' and 10 per cent 'feeling'."

"In the frontal cortex is everything that makes you clever and everything that makes you a nice person to be around.

"Ten per cent of the time they are an adult, which kind of lulls you into a false sense of security," he quipped.

Wallis also warns about underage use of drugs and alcohol and says:

"Kids' brains are actually shrinking as a result of alcohol." But there is no one-size-fits-all.

I have always found dealing with adolescence over many years in education an incredibly rewarding experience. In stating that we are dealing with 'imperfect models' who do make mistakes. At Taupo-nui-a-Tia College we accept our young people do make mistakes, some of which carry consequences. The important aspect of a student's journey through college is that they learn from these mistakes and get it right in the future. We certainly do not hold these mistakes over them for the rest of their time through college. In cases when students do get it wrong, working with parents is essential because it sends the consistent message to the student. This teamwork approach in most cases works. Conversely, parents working against the school to defend unacceptable behaviour is counterproductive and sends the wrong message to a young person.

Last year's review of NCEA has brought some changes that will be implemented over the next few years. Some of these changes include:

- Make NCEA more accessible Zero fees, fewer barriers for all learners, including those with disabilities and support needs by minimising the need for Special Assessment Conditions.
- Mana orite mo te mataranga Maori Equal status for matauranga Maori in NCEA. Develop new ways to support Maori learners and te ao Maori pathways.
- Having fewer, larger Achievement Standards New achievement standards and resources will be developed to replace existing standards to allow more time for learning with fewer assessments (full implementation of Level 1 in 2023).
- Strengthen literacy and numeracy requirements – these Unit Standards are externally assessed and the 20 credits attached to these standards must be passed to achieve NCEA at any level (Implemented 2023).
- Show clearer pathways to further education and employment – Develop a Vocational Entrance Award to clearly signal when a student is ready to transition into higher level education and strengthen vocational pathways through NCEA.
- Simplify NCEA's structure Credits can no longer be carried over to the next level and resubmissions will only be allowed where they take students from a Not Achieved grade to an Achieved grade. Sixty credits are required to pass each NCEA level.

Next term college staff have an "Accord Day" to learn about the changes that are being rolled out over the next few years. We look forward to updating you on these changes and the implications for your child later in the year. Most of the changes will have the greatest impact on our current Year 9 students.






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Travellers Programme

In the last month of term 1 we have had many students participating in one or more sporting events at national or regional level. As a school we are proud that so many of our students are passionate about sport and getting out there and doing it. Below is an overview of all the events students have been representing Taupo-nui-a-Tia College.

Volleyball National SS senior Tournament.

Our girls' team competed for the first time in Nui history at the BOPSS Champs. In Division 1 at national Level, they finished second and came home with a silver medal. Our boys also played well in Division 3.

Unfortunately, after a strong start for the girls and winning most of the pool games, two of our players were injured and no longer able to play. The girls finished 14th out of 96 teams and the boys were 12th (44th overall) out of 80 teams in 5 divisions.
