PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Tēnā koutou katoa,

This year's annual Principal's Report will be a combined effort between myself, and Mr Murphy, who was Acting Principal for Term One and Term Two of this year. It's our pleasure to share with you our thoughts on 2022. Mr Murphy will share some of his reflections on the first half of the year, and then I will share my reflections from term three onwards.

From Mr Murphy

Tēnā koutou katoa,

During the transition from the leadership of Peter Moyle to our new Principal, Mr Claxton, I had the privilege of performing the Acting Principal role. This was a great honour and I am extremely thankful for the experience during a very interesting time in our history. While we have had lockdowns in the previous two years and as a community moved to online learning for extended periods, 2022 presented a very different scenario. As we entered the school year, different alert levels and requirements for schools were introduced. A mask mandate was introduced, rules around exercising, singing and other performances indoors and limits on numbers in gatherings continued. On the 24th February, we had our first cases of COVID reported in our school community. Within 2 weeks, more than 100 students were confirmed as positive cases. This along with people isolating as household or close contacts had a significant impact upon attendance at school. Not just for students but also for staff.



The ability to adapt, being agile, and differentiation became key. Rather than just being able to work like we all had in lockdown, consideration needed to be made for those in the classroom and those at home. This was a significant mind shift for all parties and not easy. To physically keep the school open, rostering home was required. Colours Day and other events were canceled. However, new positive practices emerged. A new programme for Year 9s began that gave them a fantastic introduction to our school spirit and the marvelous leadership of our Year 13s. Teaching programmes were refined, pedagogy became more individualised. Even our large traditional pōwhiri to welcome Year 9 students became four pōwhiri.

Throughout this incredibly challenging time, the resourcefulness and resilience of staff and whānau was evident to ensure our tamariki were supported in their academic and social development.

This was never more evident as we emerged from restrictions and progressed into the winter season. Team sports thrived under the guidance of many teachers and whānau, giving a much needed structure for people to interact in a positive way. Other schools were struggling to bring people together and field teams, including schools of much greater size. This, combined with the quality of the performance, reflected incredibly well upon us. Our participation in the first Chiefs Manawa 1st XV Girls Rugby Competition was a special highlight.

Before I pass back to Mr Claxton I would like to thank and acknowledge the work of Mr Kevin Insley, who was the Chairperson of our Board over the past cycle and aboard member for six years. Your support, guidance and leadership has been valued.

From Matua Ben/Mr Claxton

I would like to extend a personal acknowledgement to Mr Murphy for his integrity and leadership of our kura over Term One and Two. I am extremely grateful to have the support of Mr Murphy and an outstanding senior leadership team.

I also need to make mention of Peter Moyle, who led our kura for 15 years up until the end of 2021. Peter helped to build a kura which has a well-deserved reputation around the rohe for producing positive outcomes for its students, and one which has a positive school culture. It's my intention to continue this legacy. I commit to doing the very best I can.

I was warmly welcomed into our kura with an amazing powhiri at the beginning of Term Three. It is a moment I will remember and cherish forever. It quickly became evident there was a special wairua about Taupo nui-a-Tia College. I am very fortunate and privileged to be able to lead this kura and be a part of such a supportive community. Aroha nui!



I am looking forward to seeing our NCEA results for 2022 when they are released early next year. Our current data indicates we fare favourably with national data at NCEA levels one, two, and three, however there is always work to

be done to ensure we are producing equitable outcomes for all.

One of my first impressions about this place was our incredible student leadership team for 2022. Renata Ngata (Head Boy), Angelina Paenga (Head Girl), Xavier Skelton (Deputy Head Boy), Uleah Foua (Deputy Head Girl) are all great ambassadors for our kura. All four have bright futures ahead of them and I can't wait to see where they end up. All four of our Head Students embody our eight Cornerstone Values and we are very proud of them.

In 2022, we have been involved in the Literacy and Numeracy pilot for the new co-requisite standards which will ultimately replace the way students are credentialed for literacy and numeracy. Large numbers of junior students have had the opportunity to sit these co-requisite standards digitally in 2022. We will continue with the pilot in 2023 before full implementation of these standards in 2024, along with the full implementation of the new NCEA Level One standards.

Our new five-classroom block, named Te Ao Marama, is completed. Te Ao Marama, loosely translated into English means, the place/world where the light of understanding occurs. Te Ao (place/world) and Marama (to know or understand). We are looking forward to seeing the education brief for this building come to fruition. It is designed to be a space of interdisciplinary learning where students and teachers are encouraged to collaborate with each other. I can't wait to see it in action in 2023!

A highlight during Term Three was being able to attend the Ngāti Tūwharetoa Taiopenga Festival - the first since 2019. Our kapa haka rōpu, Te Awhiorangi, blew the roof off a packed house at the AC Baths! We were all so proud of our rangatahi who performed their hearts out. A massive thanks must go to Matua Snow for all the blood, sweat and tears preparing our rōpu for the performance.

Our kura is blessed to have such a hard working group of senior leaders, deans, teaching staff, and support staff. I know we have the best job in the world, but at times it can be challenging working with teenagers. Working with teenagers is rewarding, exhilarating, and exhausting all at the same time. I want to thank all of the seen and unseen mahi that has gone into creating lessons, marking and moderating student work, writing reports, communicating with whānau, providing pastoral care to students, and generally being "in loco parentis" for the rangatahi at our kura. You are awesome!

Looking ahead to 2023, I am excited about what next year will bring. I believe my primary role as Principal is to continue to build teacher capacity. I look forward to working with our teaching staff to see how we can continue to improve and remain current for the rangatahi that we teach on a day to day basis.

ROD FORREST



As a teacher I often get asked “how did you end up teaching and why do you do it?”

The truth is I love the job and love seeing the creative design solutions the students here at the college come up with.

After originally being talked out of becoming a teacher by my maths teacher in favour of getting industry experience first, I started an internship with a company called ‘Fletcher Forests’ - ok I know, I know I have heard all of the jokes ... Forrest Gump ones too!

My training centred on mapping, survey and land information systems and GIS. I was responsible for mapping the company’s central North Island forests before moving into forest estate valuation and IT project management. I worked for Fletchers for 25 years before by chance I saw an advertisement in the local newspaper for a relief Technology teacher for 6 months at Taupō Nui-a-Tia. After being successful with my application and the teacher who I was relieving for didn’t return, I was offered a permanent job here at the college on the basis I gained my teaching qualifications. With that in mind, I started my one-year intense teaching diploma via the University of Waikato and well the rest is history. I’ve stuck with the job ever since and have been part of Nui life from spirit week to interhouse events, supporting major school productions and supporting the school leadership team on property projects. Interestingly, as a student at Nui, I drew the first set of plans for the initial canteen building and subsequently have worked on a wide range of school improvement projects. You could say that I have left my mark

The times have changed a lot since I was a student at school taking a course called Technical Drawing (now called DVC); the subject has become more digital with the use of computer aided design systems [CAD] taking over jobs that were previously pen and pencil. This means I now get to continue learning about my passion - designing, computer modelling and digital fabrication while teaching young people. These are skills that are increasingly relevant to learners in the 21st century and I love sharing my knowledge and experiences with the Nui community.

OUR NEW PRINCIPAL

BEN CLAXTON

At the beginning of Term 3, we welcomed our new Principal, Mr. Ben Claxton. The day of the Powhiri was teeming with heavy rain, which may well have represented the tears of his last school, Papatoetoe High School, as he left there to come to Taupo-nui-a-Tia College. As he moved into his office over the next week or so, a new era began for Nui.

Ben was born and had the first years of his life in Te Kuiti, so he is not un-used to living in a rural New Zealand town. He moved with his family to Auckland after some years, and in his young adulthood was attracted to the energy and discipline of Physical Education. One of his foundation values is that it is a worthy calling to help and support people, especially young people, to develop themselves to be the best that they can be according to their talents, and so after he qualified in Phys. Ed. he trained to be a Secondary School Teacher.

He comments that his introduction to secondary school teaching was tough, far harder than he had imagined it would be. Many of us in the profession can totally identify with the stress of establishing ourselves with our students as being an adult who it is worth their while to listen to. BUT gradually he became respected and established, and in recent times he was one of the Deputy Principals at Papatoetoe High School.

Ben has a Post Graduate Master of Professional Studies Degree in Education. His special study was to examine in depth why there is a gap in academic achievement between Māori and Pasifika students, compared to students identifying as Asian or New Zealand European students. He believes passionately that a school such as Nui is an integral part of the community that it sits in, and that two-way communication is vital for the nurture and development of the young people in the school's and community's care. He believes that it is important to be creative and flexible, and that it is fundamental always to look for the good in any person or situation and to encourage the flame of positive development, whether it be small or bright.

We welcome Ben, our fifth Principal in sixty-two years, his wife Megan, and his three sons aged 6, 4, and 18 months, to our school and our community. We look forward to his leadership and his inspiration, and we trust that he finds his time with us in this school exciting and fulfilling.

1968-2022 and counting.....

I came to Taupo nui-a-Tia College as a student teacher in September, 1967. Our 'teaching sections' were either 4 or 6 weeks. Late in October, I applied for a full time job teaching English, History and Social Studies. I was accepted-by telegram! (this was the olden days!).

It was hard establishing yourself in a new school, as a new teacher. You had to persevere and do your absolute best every day. Sometimes I would snatch a half hour nap-I was so tired- in the boys' sick bay. There was no mattress, only a wire bed (the girls' sick bay had the only mattress!!).

My classroom, prefab T.4, right at the end of the line, had a coke-burning (no, not the drink) pot-belly stove in the back right hand corner. By interval, we could often get the bottom section red-hot!

My senior class was a 5th form (year 11) history class. The students were lively and interesting. One was Louisa Erikson. It was not until the end of the year that she revealed she had an identical twin sister elsewhere in the school, and that sometimes, I taught Maria, thinking that she was Louisa!

By the end of 1968, I realised that I could make a success of teaching. I really liked my classes, and related well to teenagers. I made a real effort to learn from my errors, and to seek to improve.

In 1970, the Principal, Mr. Tritt (only the HOD English called him Fred, and that was only at special events like the staff party at the end of the year-we thought that the HOD English was putting on airs!) made me Careers Advisor. I remained in this position (which was then, as now, in addition to your teaching-I think I dropped one class) until the end of 1974. I was "Boys Careers Advisor" and there was also a "Girls Careers Advisor", although we often helped the opposite gender. I worked alongside some notable women, including Marian Thomsson, Shona Bleakley, and Iona Hirst.

In 1974, I was made Dean of Third Forms, together with Merle Dawson. I enjoyed the work and the responsibility, and when Allen Chang left at the end of the year to become the first Deputy Principal at Tauhara College, I took over his role of Dean of Senior School, which was Years 12 and 13. I, of course, kept teaching Social Studies and History. I remained Dean of Senior School until the end of 1998, and, although it was hard work, I found it very fulfilling and made many long-lasting friendships.

At the end of 1968, the HOD Art, later Deputy Principal, Norm Pointon, suggested that we organise a 5-day camp at Waihaha Bay in the Western Bays of Lake Taupo. This was to do general tidy-up and conservation work on that side of the lake. The idea was that we would take the "accredited" Year 12 students-those who didn't have to sit the external University Entrance exam because they had been granted the award already, due to their excellent work during the year. I worked with him to organise the first camp, which went very well, and kept organising these camps with the assistance of many staff members, right up until 1997. I still have ex-students, some of them now in their 60's, reminisce on the wonderful experience that those camps were.

Early in 1970, a deputation of Year 12 students led by Jan Smith, came to earnestly request me to take responsibility for producing the school magazine, Tauponapona. It was falling on hard times, and teachers naturally hesitated to take it on. After some thought I agreed, and, together with an enthusiastic student committee and some excellent staff help from Andrew Baber, Michael Wilson and Hans Wildeboer in particular, we rescued Tauponapona and handed it over in 1991. Again, it was very hard work, but also very fulfilling.

Michael Drake

At the end of 1998, I resigned as Senior Dean, and dropped back to teaching three classes, all in the junior school. One of the Deputy Principals, Peter Moyle, was interested in setting up a special class for academically able to gifted teenagers. He asked me to investigate the possibility to develop and teach such a course, and the Enhanced Learning Programme was born. I used and developed the well-established Future Problem Solving Programme, which came out of the USA in the 1970's. There were two courses, one for Year 9 and one for Year 10. There were generally two classes of specially selected students, about 28 students in each, at each level. These classes were very successful, and many ex-students remember them with pleasure and continue to use the intellectual skills that they developed.

By 2013, I was 69 years old, and decided to step away from the classroom. I taught my last class on Thursday, December 12, period 2, my Year 10 ELP. It was done.

I entered teaching in 1968 with the belief that if I treated my students with understanding, empathy and grace, and constantly looked for the good in them while also doing my best to help them develop their talents, then they would generally treat me with kindness and understanding in return. I never had cause to change that hypothesis. It was hard work, but in the end, my classes always supported me. I miss them still.

Since the end of 2013, I have worked in the archives area of the school for a few hours a week. I enjoy this, and I especially enjoy the ongoing contact with staff and students at Nui. In the New Years Honours in 2021, I was awarded a Queen's Service Medal for my long service to education, mostly at Nui, and to the Taupo Community. I was astonished and honoured by this award, and I would never have imagined that my beginnings as a brand new teacher in 1968 would have such an outcome.




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THE ORIGINALS

It has been a busy year for Badminton at Nui. We practice every Wednesday and Friday after school. We have attended the Junior and Senior Badminton Central Bay of Plenty Qualifiers held in Rotorua. All our teams successfully qualified from Rotorua and went on to compete at the Bay of Plenty Finals held in Tauranga.

The Finals were a great occasion with all our teams competing and representing Nui wonderfully well. Each team played exceptionally well with some superb results in the Division Two Finals as follows:

Our Junior Boys won the Finals.

Our Junior Girls placed fourth overall.

Our Senior Boys were third overall.

Our Senior Girls placed fourth overall.

In between winning the medals above, Nui has also taken up the chance to play other schools weekly in Rotorua. This has been a great opportunity for a wide range of our junior players to experience playing against other students from other schools and improve their skills at the same time.

It has been a great year and roll on 2023.



CYCLING

Cycling at Nui for 2022 falls into four different categories; Road, Track, Mountain Bike and Cyclecross.

A small but dedicated group of riders compete in all of the above, with many doing more than one discipline.

Their hard work has been rewarded with National and Regional titles as well as winning and making the podium in many other races, often against adult competition.

CYCLECROSS: A winter only sport, often in extreme mud, saw many races take place, including the Cycling NZ North Island Schools as well as the Nationals. A keen group of mud enthusiasts went to these races with great results. Coen Nicol did well, managing to win the North Island Schools in Under 20 Boys and also defend his National Title to win the Cycling NZ Under 19 Boys.

MOUNTAIN BIKING: With the season getting off to a slow start as things came back on stream event wise it was great that the Cycling NZ National Champs could be held early in the year. Several riders reached the podium with Mia Cameron 2nd in the Under 20 Girls and James Officer the National Title for first in the Under 20 Boys.

Mia and James have also competed in Europe this year – no easy feat. Notable was Mia finishing 38th at the UCI Mountain Bike Worlds, with James holding his place in fields of riders of up to 140.

ROAD CYCLING: Most events feature a general road ride, hill climb, time trial and often a team time trial. Competing against the big Auckland schools that have multiple teams and professional coaches is always difficult, but the riders did really well especially our Under 16 Female riders, with top 10 finishes both individually and in the Time Trial Team.

TRACK: With only one rider representing the school, it was great that Amelie Wood was able to place third overall in the North Island Schools Track in the Under 16 Girls.

In summary, like many other sports it was a weird season with Covid interruptions initially, but to come away with two National Titles plus many seconds and thirds, as well as dominating other open age grade races saw 'Nui' punching well above its weight across the cycling disciplines.



BOYS RUGBY



The 2022 season started with the mandates being in place and it was not clear who could play or not, including who our opposition would be able to field. It will be a year to remember and the 3rd year of Covid disruption.

We got there in the end with mandates for school sports being removed. At the early stages of the season many teams were actually hit with Covid and our boys did not miss this chance to experience it. They thrived in catching Covid, which did delay the preseason commitments we had lined up - (and competitions respectively). Both games were close and gave TNT a feel for the level expected.



Round 1 consisted of 7 games where we placed 4th. This was a good result considering Covid, injuries and a couple of key players being out for other commitments. Round 2 was what we were targeting, which is where the trophy is offered. We competed well and completed the round in 3rd place which meant an away semi to Otumoetai. Up until that point, we were the only team to have beaten them in competition play. The boys fought well but it was not our day. They were beaten in the final by a very strong Mount team whom we had lost to previously.

The highlight for the season was seeing the boys being able to have fun and express themselves on the field, playing a brand of rugby they chose to play; open, expansive and giving it a go from anywhere on the field. As a coaching team it was never about the winning, it was about personal growth for these boys and we feel they got that. We hope to see them in years to come enjoying their rugby and the connections they make from playing sport.



We were seeing a number of boys make either the King Country Under 16 or Under 18 Representative Squads. Both rep teams performed well and certainly are able to match against First Division Unions. Both rep teams are majority TNT players which is a reflection on our school.

The future looks positive and we have a number of great boys in the mix for next year.

Go and achieve great things, Nui students of 2022!


CLAY TARGET SHOOTING

YEAR 11 - Resistant Materials, wood

Year 11 students have been participating in two wood based projects that are a mixture of achievement standards and unit standards.

PROJECT ONE

Their first project was to make a wooden tray accurately to a standard set of plans. This involved things like dove tail and housed joints that had specific dimensional requirements, add a base to a tight fit, sand to finish and apply a coating of oil.

PROJECT TWO

The major project this year was for them to design and make a piece of furniture, with the brief stating that it had to organise their lives by storing and protecting a specific object or objects. Again, this year had its specifications and constraints concerning its maximum dimensions and that it had to be produced safely and have a high-quality finish.

The design folder component required the students to use a suggested design process to make a furniture project they have designed themselves and was done partially by free hand sketching techniques and computer design and research.



YEAR 10 - Resistant Materials, Wood & Metal

Year 10 is a great opportunity for the students to get a taste of what resistant materials has to offer. They get to design & build two projects and work with both wood and metal.

PROJECT ONE

Is to design and manufacture a toy for a child. We altered the brief & specifications for this project so that it was up to the average age of 14 years old.

PROJECT TWO

They get to make a metal tool box. This is to be made accurately to a plan that is given to them. This is where they must show that they can read plans and transfer details to a workpiece with accuracy.

YEAR 12 - Resistant Materials, wood

The students of Year 12 Resistant Materials Wood are working on a mixture of achievement standards and unit standards.

THE DESIGN PROCESS

Like the real world, the students were required to find a client, negotiate in an interview situation, then to use the design process to manufacture a furniture product using a fully set of working drawings that they had to produce themselves.

THE PRACTICAL SKILLS

Their first project, the construction of a hall mirror where the students were required to make the item from a standard set of plans with accuracy, was of utmost importance.

This involves things like mortise and tenon, cross-halving, rebating joints and the placing of a mirror into a frame.

The major project for this year was to make a piece of furniture, with the brief stating that it had to be some sort of table, with a constraint concerning its dimensions and that it had to serve and solve a specific purpose.

This requires the students to be competent in the use of portable power tools and, added to this, the ability to finish off and apply the coatings that go towards producing a quality product to a high standard.

The students have again surprised me with the wonderful ideas they came up with. They have produced some very nice design work, which has been supported by some very nice practical project work.

RESISTANT MATERIALS

YEAR 13-Trades, Carpentry & Joinery

2022 has been an exciting and busy year for the students taking our year 13 Trades Carpentry course.

We are completing a school/community based project this year which is going by the name of, The Rangatahi Marae DIY, the schools marae development project.

The design we have come up with has been ongoing for some time now and has had input from our outside community, our Maori department, its students, and the schools management team.

This is ongoing, three year project that involves:

For 2022, the removal and reconstruction of the entrance/waharoa.

For 2023, the construction of a covered shelter for the manuhiri/visitors & some pa style fencing.

For 2024, the construction of a covered shelter for the tangata whenua/people linked to this marae & some pa style fencing.

There are also plans that involve landscaping, carvings, and navigational teaching space & more.

This is another great opportunity for the students to get a very real hands-on experience of the building and construction industries.

They worked as a team with leadership roles to have completed both theoretical and practical industrial Unit Standards from BCITO that are on offer here.

The students have also had the opportunity to learn about and use Pneumatic Power Nail Guns and Powder Actuated Power Tools, these are tools that use gunpowder to fire high tensile nails, or compressed air and are use in the construction industry to connect timber to concrete and or steel.

SAFETY and FIRST AID

The students also get the opportunity to participate in the First Aid Course that we run in conjunction with other subject areas of the school. Here they get to learn what is involved with emergency first aid, providing first aid and resuscitation through theory and scenario roll playing.

The Licence to Work Programme is all about helping young people to gain the insight, confidence and skills to get work, keep work and create careers. We have heaps of fun, visit lots of places and learn the skills we need to be 'Set for Life!'

It has been a busy year with the Term 1 focus on workplace visits, and Term 2 on employability workshops. These workshops build on the seven employability skills that employers say they want. During Term 3, students are placed on work experience. For some, this has turned into employment early on, while others are working towards full time employment at the end of their placement.

Junior Music

Our Year 10 program is split into technology and theory streams, each running for one semester in duration. Despite Covid restrictions, we have managed our trips to the movies and Napier. This year we also took our tech students for a visit to AVP where they were privileged to learn how to mix with state of the art equipment. The focus for Year 10 is to build practical skills and introduce basic ideas for NCEA Level 1, and to soak in many genres of music.



Bands

DRAMA

2022 has had all the ups and downs you would expect from a 'Covid-19 year' for the drama Whanau at TNT. Unexpected illnesses (and therefore absences) presented us with all sorts of challenges to overcome: cast changes, assessment delays and shortened rehearsal times created lots of opportunities to sharpen our ability to be flexible, adaptable, and resilient. Although we missed out on visiting theatre groups such as the "Ugly Shakespeare Company", we've focussed more on producing our own theatrical storytelling. Proof of creative problem-solving abounded in our department, and was highlighted in talented performances at every year level: from year 9's learning to shape Māori creation korero using drama conventions, to our live shows from the senior drama courses.

Not only that, but we hosted the SGCNZ UOSW South Waikato Regional Shakespeare Festival, which saw us win two places at the National Festival in Wellington.

At year 11, Kiwis Come Out at Night is the first live performance many drama students partake in, and is also their first dip into what it's like being on stage; various extracts are rehearsed, learned and performed in front of a real audience (this year it was Ophelia Thinks Harder, Eating the Wolf, Peninsula and Fresh Off the Boat). In 2022 the year 12 and 13 drama students took on the challenge of learning the works of William Shakespeare, which ranged from working with a Star Wars tribute, to producing a combined performance assessment of a full play with a modern take on Shakespeare's King Lear.





“All the world’s a stage, and all the men and women merely players”, according to time-honored, master playwright, William Shakespeare. However, it’s a little difficult to create a ‘world of play’ when the players are unable to get together with other players! This was the challenge the South Waikato community of schools faced at the beginning of 2022, with many schools not allowing ‘mingling’ between schools under the ‘red traffic light’ system.

So how do we host the SGCNZ UOSW South Waikato Regional Shakespeare Festival where schools from around the region come together to celebrate William Shakespeare’s works in a variety of contexts? We film the performances under each school’s covid rules and submit them for judging!

Luckily, the traffic lights changed to orange in time for us to hold the Taupo nui-a-Tia performance entries in front of an audience of family and college friends. This year, we entered two student-directed 5-minute entries and one 15-minute teacher-directed entry. Year 13 students directed a modern take on Two Gentlemen of Verona (set in the changing rooms following a private school rugby practice) and an 80s version of A Midsummer Night’s Dream. The 15-minute entry was a music-filled, ensemble performance of The Taming of the Shrew.

The festival assessors were two amazing actors (about to showcase their talents in the upcoming Te Reo version of Frozen, as Elsa & Hans respectively), Awhimai Fraser and James Tito, and they were most impressed with our talent pool here at Nui. The Midsummer Night’s Dream extract won best 5-minute scene, while Taming of the Shrew won best 15-minute scene, meaning two places at the National Festival in Wellington.

Queen’s Birthday weekend saw further lifting of the ‘school mingling’ restrictions, and two vans (plus trailer), packed full of set, excited cast and previous year’s London winners, heading to the Nationals for 5 days of workshops, theatre visits, performances and adventure.

We had massive amounts of fun with much laughing, crying, socialising and overcoming some huge challenges to win five coveted awards!!

A Midsummer Night’s Dream (5-minute, student-directed by Grace Hoyles and Ella Knight) won two awards:

Outstanding Make-up and Most Co-operative Group Backstage Taming of the Shrew (15-minute, teacher-directed) won three awards:

Outstanding Presentation from a Comedy, Outstanding Performance in a Supporting Role - Kylie Bathe (Minstrel), and Best Connection with the audience - Joseph Craggs (Petruccio)

Kyle Bathe was also selected from the Nationals to participate in NSSP (National Production Week, with a 50% chance of being selected for a trip to London’s Globe Theatre).





Enhanced Performance Dance

In 2010, the Enhanced Performance Dance programme was created. This programme recognises the prior learning of dancers who have been studying dance at studios. Through the programme, Year 9 and 10 dancers could complete NCEA Level 1, 2 and 3 as their performance skills are already at that level. The programme then further enhanced dancers to develop their choreographic skills and also be part of dance shows and dance competitions. Since 2010, the Enhance Performance Dance programme has seen many changes in education and at Taupo nui-a-Tia College, but has stayed the course and has produced successful results year after year. The academic results show Year 9 and 10 students gaining NCEA Level 1, 2 and in some cases Level 3 Dance with Excellence. Dancers have also obtained NCEA Dance Scholarships – the highest academic accolade while at school. At competition level, Taupo nui-a-Tia College dancers have been part of DanceNZMade since 2009 and have placed or won Regionals, and placed or won at Nationals. This is a phenomenal track record. This year EPD students had phenomenal success at DanceNZMade Regionals and at the time of writing this article were preparing in earnest for Nationals:

Year 9-10 Team (Choreographed by Georgia Fox current EPD student) – 1st Place

Year 11-13 Team (Choreographed by Caitlyn MacRae ex-EPD student) – 1st Place

Open Team (Choreographed by Onera Beck and Ruby Wood current EPD students) – 2nd Place

Open Team (Choreographed by Cameron Smith ex-EPD student) – 1st Place and Regional Champion.

All these teams will represent the College at DanceNZMade Nationals at the end of Term 3.

We also had incredible success with our soloists at DanceNZMade:

Year 9 – Anika Beck 1st and a nomination to compete at Nationals, Meg Hogan 2nd.

Year 11 – Ruby Watts 1st and Taylor Weston 2nd.

Year 13 – Onera Beck 1st and a nomination to compete at Nationals.

Our duo results were outstanding too:

Year 9 – Meg Hogan and Anika Beck 2nd place and Milla Watts and Sophia Blewett 3rd

Meg and Anika as well as Ruby Wood and Keira Wood will be representing the college at DanceNZMade Nationals in the Duet category.

The Open Team, choreographed by Onera Beck and Ruby Wood, will compete at PACANZ in October. PACANZ is the Performing Arts Competition Associations of New Zealand. To go to PACANZ a dancer or a team must be nominated.


Both Onera Beck (Y13) and Ruby Watts (Y11) will be representing their dance Studios at PACANZ this year for the Solo Competition section.






