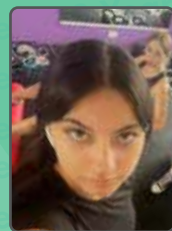

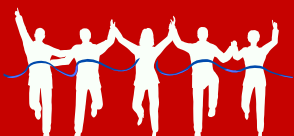

Our senior leadership team, comprised of Richard Murphy, Brenda Ronke, Stephen Fowler, and Maria Heaslip, ably supported by our executive officer, Louise Berney, work tirelessly to try and create the best outcomes we can for our ākonga.

Thank you to our pastoral care team, from the deans to our Bay Trust staff, our nurse, our counsellor, all humans who care for other people's children like their own.

Thank you to our Heads of Faculty and our Kaiako, who also care for other people's children like their own. People who lose sleep thinking and planning for the success of other people's children.

Thank you to our support staff - from the admin team, the property staff, the canteen staff, our learning assistants, our various technicians - so many people, about 130 be more specific, who strive daily to create the best outcomes for our ākonga in their various roles. Taupo-nui-a-Tia College really is a beautiful big machine, and I'm extremely proud of all of you. I make a conscious effort daily, while I'm driving to work, to be grateful for the privilege and responsibility it is to lead this kura.

I would also like to acknowledge our Head students for 2023, Zach Harrison, Lilja Tinworth, Kaspar Lenoir, and Teuwira Rameka-Keremete. They have worked seamlessly together and I'm proud of their contributions to our kura this year. Their feedback has been valued, and I hope the four of them have enjoyed the privilege and responsibility of helping to lead Taupō-nui-a-Tia College in 2023.

We have had a couple of long serving staff members announce their retirement this year. It's important we make mention of them and their service to our kura. Kay Grant, our Careers Advisor, resigned at the end of term 1 this year. Kay started with us in 1986 and served with us for 37 years. Amanda Fox, who works in Science, but has also taught Physical Education, is retiring at the end of this year. Amanda started with us at the beginning of 1985, that means Amanda has served for 38 years! To put both of these incredible women's service into perspective, I would have been three years old when Amanda started and four years old when Kay started. To serve in one kura for the number of years that both of these women have is a remarkable achievement, and we honour you now.

I feel like if we can do it well, the secondary school years could be the best years of a young person's life. School should be a fun, engaging, mentally and physically stimulating place to be.



For the me, the beginning of 2023 involved some firsts:

- Colours Day is one of those examples. It was cool to see students from our four houses participating in all types of different activities - from the traditional athletic events, to some more non-traditional events and activities. Building and maintaining the healthy house spirit and competition is something we excel at here.
- This is more of a lowlight: Industrial Action - strike days and rostering home. We all thought and hoped that 2023 would be without disruption to teaching and learning, but it turns out it was not to be. Term 1 and 2 were tricky! I have been so impressed at the resilience of the students and staff as they have worked to catch up on the time we lost in classrooms earlier this year.
- Grease was a slick production! So much time, energy and other resources were pumped into this event. I'm sure many of you saw it at least once. Viv Gowdy and her amazing team of students and staff made us all so proud with their efforts leading up to the production week and during the production week itself.
- Our School Ball was another first for me, and what a night it was! The students conducted themselves with grace and dignity and I know that everyone who attended had a great time. One of my highlights was seeing and hearing about the various ways that students turned up to the events. We had motorcycle brigades, students arriving on horses, I think someone even turned up in a fire engine. It really was entertaining!

- Tūwharetoa Taiopenga Kapa Haka Festival, was one of the first events where I witnessed our students representing our kura in such a public platform. Te Awhiorangi again represented their whakapapa, their whānau, their Māori culture, and our kura with such power and passion. The various haka tautoko which reverberated around the Taupō Events Centre demonstrated just how well Te Awhiorangi performed.

- Many have mentioned to me how special our annual Spirit Week is. We had to postpone it from the end of term 2 (due the rostering home) to the end of term 3. My first experience of Spirit Week, again demonstrated the house spirit and pride our students have for our school. It's one of those events where it is difficult to explain some of the activities that occur, but to witness the week first hand, and see how engaged the majority of our students were in the activities was a real highlight. It was definitely a magic way to end term three!

As I've already mentioned, although the beginning of the year was disrupted significantly by the industrial action, affecting every secondary school in NZ, I have been so proud of the way our students and staff have worked hard to overcome the challenges of missing

chunks of learning. I am looking forward to seeing our NCEA results for 2023 when they are released early next year. We are always striving to try and produce excellent outcomes for our students, and I'm very proud of the team sitting behind me who help to make this occur for our students here.

Throughout 2023, our staff have been working hard to prepare for the implementation of the new NCEA level 1 in 2024. NCEA level 1 is intended to provide students with a broad foundation of learning to help students continue to explore where their passions and interests lie.

I also want to honour our students who have achieved their own individual success through sport, music, the arts, and cultural activities. We've been promoting 90%+ attendance all year, I'm sure the students are sick of us talking about it all the time, but it really does make a difference. Attending at 90%+ or better is a success to celebrate all on its own. Our kura really is a place where students have every opportunity to succeed and I'm proud of what we do achieve. All we ask of our students is they bring their best to school each day and get stuck in. So, my encouragement to all of our rangatahi here, whether you're leaving

us as a year 13 this year, or whether you'll be back next year, is to keep getting involved. Don't ask the world (or the school) what can I take from you? But ask, how can I contribute back? Because it's there, you will find fulfilment.

Looking ahead to 2024, I am excited about what next year will bring. My most important role as principal is to continue to build teacher capacity. I look forward to working with all our staff next year to continue to try and create the best educational experience for our students that we can. We know we have such an important role to play in the lives of young people, and along with great responsibility, it is a great privilege.

Report

The next big property projects are the re-roofing of some blocks for weather tightness, with the old music room getting a new roof over the last holidays.

Terms 1 and 2 saw the teachers who are union members, striking for better working conditions and pay. This was a frustrating time for the board as we supported the teachers in what they were wanting but couldn't do anything about it. Even though we are the employers we do not do any of the contract negotiations. As parents, we were also frustrated with our children missing school because of the strikes

after so much school was disrupted over the past few years.

Towards the end of Term 2, after the production week, and when everyone was getting very tired from the lack of movement between the government and the union, we treated the whole staff to an appreciation week. The mid-term board elections were held recently and Kylie Leonard and myself were reappointed to the board for 3 years. Just before the parent elections was the student election, and we welcome Angus Putt to the board for the next 12 months. We thank Lilja Tinworth for her contribution as the elected student representative over the past 2 years. We have really appreciated your contribution. Coming to the end of his co-option is Craig Stephenson. Craig has been an important part of the board, holding the property portfolio. Thank you for your detailed reports each meeting and keeping us well informed on the

property projects going on throughout the school.

Thank you to the head of faculties who have presented or prepared reports for the board over the past 12 months. We appreciate the time and effort that goes

into those reports and the requests/suggestions that come through in them on how the school can help the students achieve.

Kay Grant retired from the staff of Taupo nui-a-Tia College at the end of Term 1 2023, having completed just over thirty-six years as a teacher with us. Kay had been a student here from 1973 to 1976, and when she left, she had no intention of returning to these walls. But, as life turned out, she was hired in late 1985 to start in 1986, and she made a notable contribution to our school culture in the years that followed.

Kay taught English as her main subject, and it is perhaps a sign of how things were that she started as the only female in a teaching department of nine! CALLUM FINDLEY

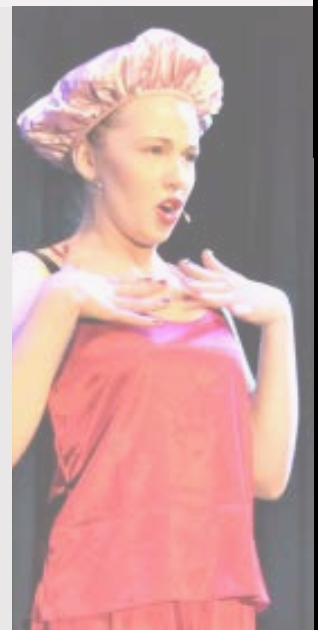

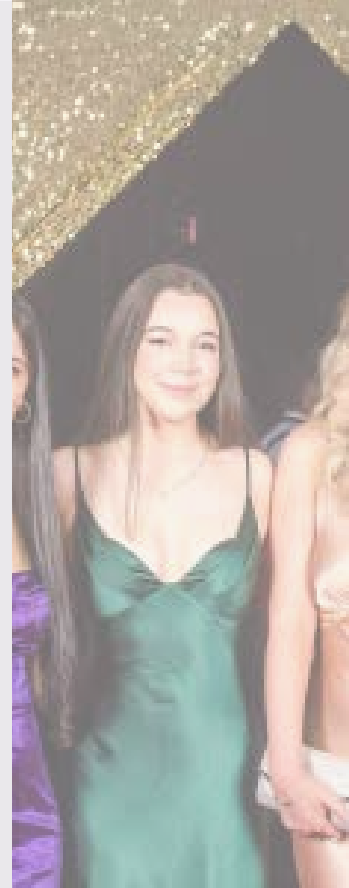

SGCNZ UOSW SHAKESPEARE FESTIVAL

"All the world's a stage, and all the men and women merely players" according to time-honoured, master playwright, William Shakespeare ... So the South Waikato community of school-players took the 'Bard's' advice and got together at the end of Term 1 to celebrate the SGCNZ UOSW Shakespeare Festival.

As the host school, Taupo nui-a-Tia entered two student-directed, 5-minute entries and one 15-minute teacher-directed entry. Year 13 students directed a modern take on *As You Like It* (set in a 'forest' of books at a library) and a hippy version of *Macbeth* and his witches. The 15-minute entry was a modern take on *The Merchant of Venice* (set as if it was the filming of the television show "The Bachelorette"). The festival assessors were two talented dramatists from across the motu, and Morrinsville College's *Macbeth* extract won best 5-minute scene and *The Merchant of Venice* won best 15-minute scene, meaning both schools needed to perform at the National Festival in Wellington. 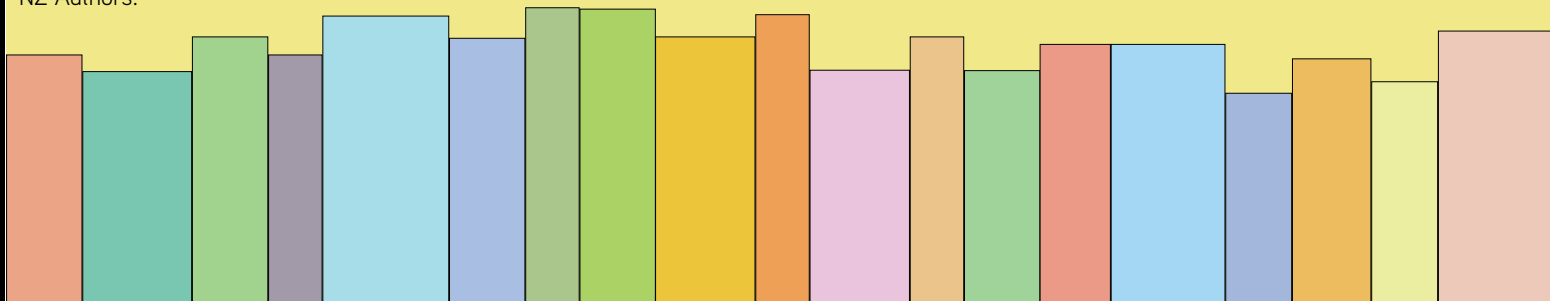
Some of the books discussed this year were:

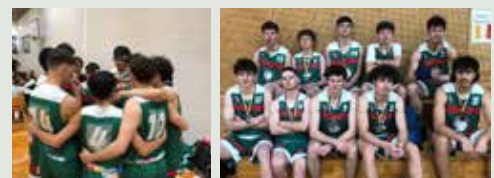


Senior Girls Prens

Waka Ama is a great sport for not only your tinana, but your wairoro as well. It's a fun way to get in some fitness and meet new people. In the summer, when it's hot out, the moana is the perfect place to be. A few things you learn when doing Waka Ama is teamwork, water safety, and communication skills. Generally, most teams are made up of six members on a W6 waka (six person waka). Communicating with your teammates and using teamwork is highly important to be able to move and control the waka. There are different positions on a waka which all have different roles. On a W6 there is number 1, the pace keeper and front end drawer. Drawing water under the front of the waka is how you make hard right turns. N2 also draws water under the front of the waka to help make right turns. N3 calls the "hups", which tells you when to switch the side that you're paddling on. N4 is known as the power house, along with N3; these are strong paddlers that push for momentum. N5 helps turn the waka by drawing the water on the left side of the waka, this helps turn the waka faster in races. And finally N6 is known as the steerer; they have a different type of paddle that controls what direction the waka goes in. Every single position in the waka is important and has different roles to move the waka. "He waka eke noa" - "a waka we are all in together" is a commonly used metaphor meaning we are all in this together, but is quite literal in this sense. This is when teamwork and communication is key. If we are out of time or aren't on the same page then all our efforts are useless, we are stronger as a team. As one. In the case that your waka flips, (which does happen but isn't as scary as you may think) you are trained in water safety for this occasion. This ensures that you stay safe on the water, combining fun and safety. I've had a lot of awesome opportunities with Waka Ama. You have an opportunity to compete in the Te Arawa Waka Ama Regionals and Waka Ama Nationals. It's an amazing experience in meeting new people and having fun competing and possibly taking home some awards. Overall, club members have had such a good time doing waka. From the fresh moana to the rewarding hakinakina, Waka Ama is the perfect sport for all. For anyone who's interested in joining the team, we'll catch you on the water.

This project provided another exceptional opportunity for students to gain tangible, hands-on experience in the building and construction sectors. They collaborated as a team, taking on leadership roles such as leading hands or foremen. This experience also afforded them the chance to become familiar with, and utilise, pneumatic power nail guns and powder actuated power tools. These are specialized tools, which, using gunpowder, can fire high-tensile nails, or compressed air, and are employed in the construction industry for attaching timber to concrete or steel.

2023 marked the progression into the second stage of the Rangatahi Marae DIY Development Project. This stage has presented an invaluable opportunity for our Year 13 Trades Carpentry and Joinery students. They've garnered hands-on construction experience aligned with the Building and Construction Industrial Training Organisation's standards. Through this project, they can attain up to 40 credits, reinforcing the value of this school/community-based initiative. The standards they're adhering to encompass areas such as Tools and Machinery, Safety, Materials, Documentation, Communication, Measurements & Calculations, coordination with other trades, and the overall development and coordination of construction projects.

The design process has been in motion for quite a while, benefiting from contributions by our external community, as well as our Maori department, its students, and the school's management team. We anticipate another year or two of development for this project. Specifically, our 2023 objectives included constructing a covered shelter for manuhiri (visitors), creating pa-style fencing complemented by retaining walls, and exploring landscaping opportunities. For 2024, we aim to construct a covered shelter for the tangata whenua (people connected to this marae), add more pa-style fencing, and build a retaining wall for a Kapehu Whetu. Future plans also encompass landscaping, introducing carvings, establishing a navigational teaching space, and more.

FASHION & TEXTILES

We've had an exciting initiative this year where the Year 11 class designed Kapa Haka kakahu for the Taupo Primary Middle School Kapa Haka Group in preparation for the Tuwharetoa Taiopenga in September. The whole department paused their projects for a week, set up a production line, and produced 30 uniforms. Our Year 9 class also did an outstanding job creating poi for the students to use. Our junior classes have crafted projects ranging from tote bags and pants, to grocery bags, bucket hats, and Op-shop upcycles. Meanwhile, our seniors have been designing and creating whatever they felt inspired to make.



The year started off really well with this group of Year 9s. As is usually the case, they were both excited and motivated to get stuck in with the practical tasks, which meant using some tools and machines that they had never used before. So of course, it is always about "Safety First". We spent a few lessons focusing on safety in the workshop and how to use the tools and machines in the workshop safely, with a focus on the use of the correct Personal Protective Equipment (PPE's) at the same time. That done, we were all set to get started on designing their wooden boxes with a specific purpose in mind and learning how to make accurate and strong finger joints that would help keep their box together for a long time. Overall, the students were able to make the most of their time in the workshop with some very pleasing results. The Year 10 group is a great opportunity for the students to get a taste of what resistant materials has to offer. They get to design and build two projects, and work with both wood and metal. Their first project was to design and make a toy for a person their age or younger. This allows the students huge scope for their designs, as we have been making toys for all ages, for as far back as our memories can take us. Then, they made a metal tool box. This is to be made accurately to a plan that is given to them. This is where they must show that they can read plans and transfer details to a workpiece with accuracy.

JUNIOR RESISTANT MATERIALS WOOD & METAL

YEAR 13 Resistant Materials (Engineering)

Well, what a year it has been! It all started way back in February, looking at and planning the year ahead. It was clear from the outset there was a lot of hard mahi ahead of us. We were straight into the theory side of our year with a look at complex machines and how they work. Next was a planning assessment with a guest speaker, David Forsyth, from Cheal who came to walk us through how to manage a project from start to finish. This was a great insight as to how even the smallest issue can throw off your plans. Now we are into building our projects. We have a good mix of 2-stroke go-karts, 50cc Mini Bikes and new for 2023, E-Powered chilly bins. It was great to see everyone working hard and collaborating on their projects, while arguing whose will be the quickest. Just like previous years, the key components of these projects come as part of a kit. However, some of these components changed for this year meaning some of the new parts did not fit. While this is not ideal, it was great to see our rangatahi not get downhearted about it, and react in a positive way even when cutting off parts of their chassis so they could remake it.

YEAR 11 Resistant Materials (Wood)

Their first project was to make a wooden tray accurately to a standard set of plans. This involved things like dove tail and housed joints that had specific dimensional requirements, then add a base to a tight fit, sand to finish and apply a coating of oil.



The major project for this year was for them to design and make a piece of furniture, with the brief stating that it had to organize their lives by storing and protecting a specific object or objects. Again, this year had its specifications and constraints concerning the maximum dimensions, and it had to be produced safely and have a high-quality finish. The design folder component required the students to use a suggested design process to make a furniture project they have designed themselves, and was done partially by free hand sketching techniques, as well as computer design and research.

YEAR 12 Resistant Materials (Wood)

Their first project was the construction of a hall mirror, where the students were required to make the item from a standard set of plans with accuracy being of utmost importance. This involves things like mortise and tenon, cross-halving, rebating joints and the placing of a mirror into a frame. The major project for this year was to make a piece of furniture, with the brief stating that it had to be some sort of table, with a constraint concerning its dimensions, and that it had to serve and solve a specific purpose. This requires the students to be competent in the use of portable power tools, which contributed to their ability to finish and apply the coatings that go towards producing a quality product to a high standard. The students have again surprised me with the wonderful ideas they can come up with every year. They have produced some very nice design work, which has been supported by some great practical project work.

YEAR 12 Resistant Materials (Engineering)

We had enough keen engineers to run two year 12 classes in 2023. Mr Simm took one of them and Mr Fowler took the other. It was amazing to see the skill development that took place, from the start of the year to the end. In year 12, students have a lot more freedom to design and construct a product of their own choice. Although some students found this freedom challenging, on the whole, the majority rose to the occasion and some awesome, creative results were achieved. The technical skills and key competencies developed during the year will serve them well in Year 13 Engineering or out in the workforce.

INTEGRATED LEARNING



Integrated learning comprises a variety of short courses, with 12 courses available in each rotation, spanning an eight-week period. These are offered to Year 9 students, allowing them to choose a course that resonates with their interests and engages them actively. Beyond a mere curriculum focus, these courses are designed to emulate real-life, authentic contexts. They integrate key educational elements such as core competencies, essential 'soft skills' for the workplace, components of numeracy and literacy, and fostering connections to the local area.



ENTERPRISE STUDIES

Enterprise at TNT has thrived this year! We engaged students from years 9, 12 and 13 in an exciting journey of entrepreneurship! The highlight of 2023 was hosting three vibrant market days, where students showcased a wide range of innovative – and yummy – products. Throughout their time in Enterprise, students were able to be creative, learnt about running a business, and even made some real money. The students of Enterprise Studies this year especially loved working in groups, problem solving, and getting to share their ideas and products with our school community!



GATEWAY

This year, Gateway has provided amazing opportunities to our senior students to explore different vocational pathways. Our students took advantage of what Gateway offers them, in gaining real work experience, on the job learning with industry standards, the chance to build relationships and network within our community.

We saw our students learn so many amazing skills, including the opportunity to gain a certificate in First Aid. It is great to see the diverse range of professions being explored, with placements provided in Earthworks, Diesel and Electrical Mechanics, Hairdressing, Vet Nursing (including equine), Agri-business and Shepherding, Electrical, Plumbing, Glider Piloting, Building, Carpentry, Pilates, and Sound and Lighting Technicians.

Yet again, we celebrated students transitioning into apprenticeships and full-time employment through their placements and we congratulate those who have been successful in this.

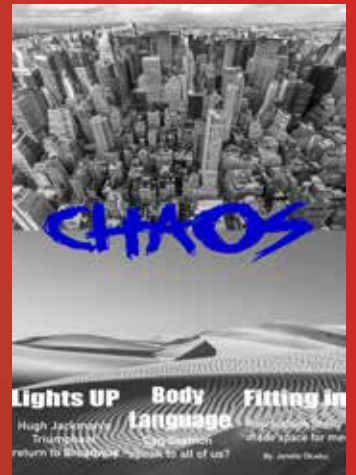

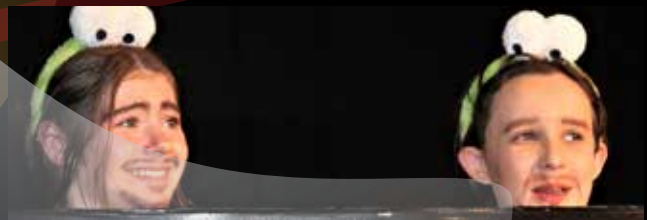

DRAMA



2023 was hopefully the last 'covid-19 year' for the drama whanau at TNT! We had all the unexpected illnesses (and therefore absences) that came with it, which presented us with all sorts of challenges to overcome: cast changes, assessment delays and rehearsal times shortened. This created lots of opportunities to sharpen our ability to be flexible, adaptable and resilient. The great news was that we saw the return of visiting theatre groups! "Ugly Shakespeare Company" came and delivered a rollicking, modern take on Shakespeare's "A Midsummer Nights' Dream" (which also made stars out of a few of our students!) Our senior students were also lucky enough to take part in a workshop on Stage Combat and sword-fighting, given by Jason Momoa's stuntman and TNT alumni, Stephen Gray.

Proof of creative problem-solving abounded in our department and was highlighted in talented performances at every year level: from year 9's learning to shape Māori creation kōrero using drama conventions, to our live shows from the senior drama courses. Not only that, but we hosted the SGCNZ UOSW South Waikato Regional Shakespeare Festival again in April, which saw us win a place at the National Festival in Wellington. On top of that, we got back into doing a big musical (after a post-covid-inspired delay of five years) by producing an excellent five-night run of Grease in June. 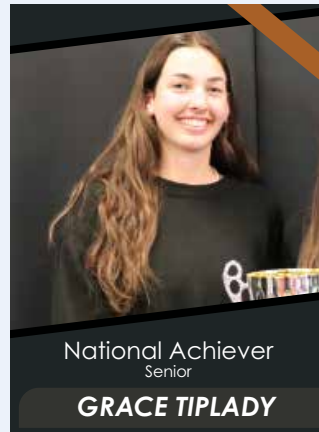
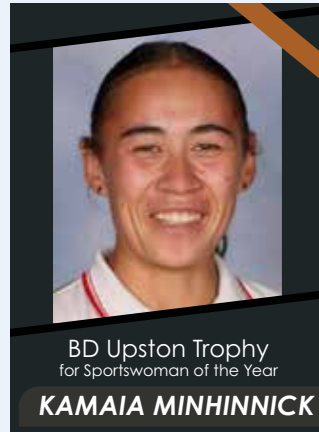
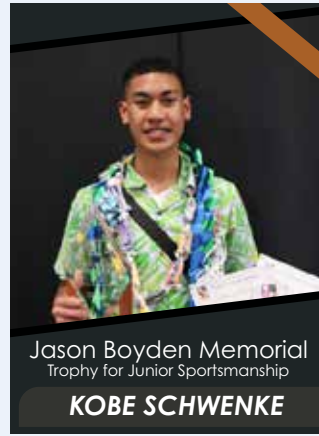


The students had a blast dressing up and exploring the lives of indigenous people in Peru. Additionally, they established connections with the Māori people of Aotearoa.

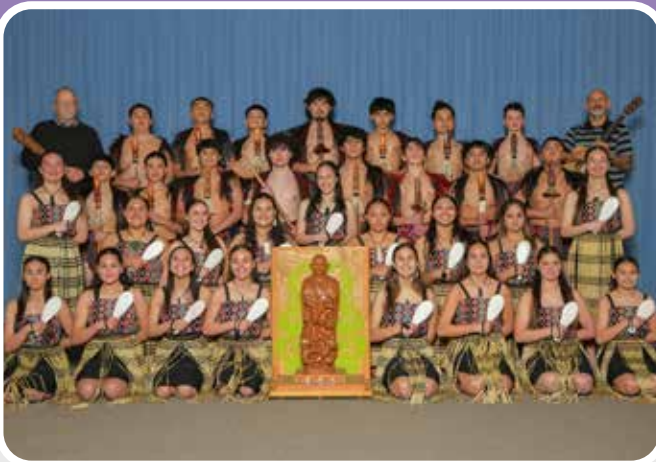
