

When you start thanking people there is a risk you will unintentionally leave someone out, but I need to acknowledge as many people as I can. We use the Māori whakatauki, he waka eke noa quite a bit here – loosely translated it means, we are all in this together. Our school is a big waka, and we need to be all paddling in the same direction to continue to be successful.

So, to start with, I would like to thank our senior leadership team, comprised of our deputy principals, Richard Murphy, Brenda Ronke, Stephen Fowler, and Maria Heaslip, ably supported by our executive officer, Alice Wichman, and our executive assistant,

Tammy Gower, who all work tirelessly to try and create the best outcomes they can for our ākonga.



To our Heads of Faculty, Teachers in charge, and our Kaiako, thank you for all the seen and unseen mahi that goes on every day, and night, to plan and deliver the best possible programmes for our ākōnga. When I am able, I consider it a privilege to be able to move around your classrooms and witness you changing lives and helping to create better humans for Taupō and our wider community.

To our support staff - the admin team, the property staff, the canteen staff, our learning assistants, and our various technicians. Well over 100 people who bring their best daily to continue to make our place the best it can possibly be.

I'm extremely proud of all of you. I make a conscious effort daily, while I'm driving to work, to be grateful for the privilege and responsibility of leading this kura.

I would also like to acknowledge our Head students for 2024, Oscar McDougall, Georgia Fox, Angus Putt and Joanne Nörtje. They are an incredible bunch of young people who have completely embodied our values of whakapono, wero, and manaakitanga. I have three young boys of my own, and I genuinely hope they can grow up to be as awesome as you lot! You can be proud of your leadership and the legacy you will leave – I know your families are extremely proud of you as well. In fact, the entire Year 13 cohort, led by our Head Students and House Leaders, has been fantastic all year long. This particular cohort has demonstrated that leadership can take many forms, and many of you, even though you have not had an official leadership title, have been amazing role models to your peers and the younger students. For me, and I know other people share this view too, this year's Year 13 cohort has set the bar for future Year 13 cohorts. I would also like to take a moment to acknowledge our Year 13 Dean, Lesley Purdon, who is stepping down from deaning at the end of this year. Your awhi and support of this year group over the past five years is also reflected in this special group of young people.

2024 has also had its share of challenges. I would like to take a moment to acknowledge the Jolland's whānau, who lost their beloved Tom over Easter this year. It was a time of immense sadness for our school and our thoughts and aroha continue to go out to Tom's family and friends.

Our Year 11 cohort was the first year group to experience the new-look NCEA Level one. The idea of fewer, larger achievement standards seemed great in theory, but in reality, was a much bigger challenge than we all expected. Throw in the literacy and numeracy co-requisite exams, along with the new external digital submissions and it culminated in palpable stress levels for our Year 11 students and their teachers. The external nature of these digital submissions has been removed for 2025 and



beyond, much to the relief of many of our Year 11 teachers.

On a more positive note, at the beginning of this year we launched our rebranded school values of whakapono, wero, and manaakitanga. Values that were embodied by the tupuna our school is named after: Tia. We are utilising the explicit teaching of these values, along with using our behavioural data, to create and refine systems and practices which will continue to enhance our school culture. I subscribe to a quote from Barbara Coloroso, author of the book, Kids Are Worth It, who says, "If kids come to us from strong, healthy, functioning families it makes our job easier. If they do not come to us from strong, healthy, functioning families, it makes our job more important." Academic excellence is paramount, but it is also my belief that we should be helping to create better humans. If we can continue to do that, then I know our school and the Taupō community will reap the benefits.

From a property point of view, we have had a number of significant projects kick off this year. Our leaky library is getting a brand new million dollar plus roof, and we are on track to have the library operational by the start of the 2025 school year. Six classrooms in H block have had a refurbishment with new carpet, windows, and autex on the walls, and we have had over 30 heat pumps installed across the school this year. H7 and H8, arguably the ugliest and coldest classrooms in the school are also currently being renovated. Our learning support property modification project, designed to improve equity of access to all areas of the school is well under way. By the beginning of 2025, all areas of the school should be wheelchair accessible, including a new lift for N block. This project involves a number of minor and major works around the school, and it is a project that absolutely needed to happen. We also have new roofs to go on our canteen and English blocks. All in all, 2024 has been a busy but productive year property-wise.

The Board of Trustees Report

I have now completed 4 years on the Board at Taupo nui a Tia College. I was co-opted on just after the first lockdown of 2020 and then was elected on last year. This has been my first "normal" year with no lock downs, rostering home of students due to waves of covid or teacher strikes. Being a normal year does not mean it has been an easy year, there has been a lot packed into 2024.

The new year started with our new strategic plan that we were finalising this time last year. This strategic plan is for this year and next. The plan encompasses the new school values which align with our strategic goals for the two years. The plan has been shared with the community and can be viewed on the school's website.

The outcome of a student suspension meeting in term one had the board hold a special meeting to review the



process followed and checked against the ministry guidelines to ensure that our process was fully compliant, which it was.

It was timely that in person training workshops by the New Zealand School Trustee Association have restarted again and early in term 2 many members of the board attended 'The Board's role in suspension' meetings and made some tweaks to our processes based on the suggestions made in the training and also from the discussions about what other schools do.

The major property works happening this year are the reroofing of library. If you have been on school grounds you will have noticed that the library is all covered in plastic wrap. Upgrades are happening down at H block and new heat pumps have been installed across the school. To come are more roof repairs and a lift to go in the Nelson Block.

The board gets regular reporting on curriculum areas each meeting and of particular interest have been the literacy and numeracy results. Whilst as a school we are doing better than the national average, there is still some work to be done to help our students achieve these standards that are necessary for them to pass level 1 NCEA. This is also the first year of the new level 1 NCEA and we know it has come with its challenges and changes have already been planned for next year. As a board we look forward to the faculty reports to hear how adaptations will be made to support our learners. Thank you to everyone who has reported to the board over the past year. We appreciate the time it takes to collate the data you present to us and also the time you give up to come and answer our questions.

Policies and procedures are continually reviewed with the link to School Docs being provided in the weekly newsletters

for anyone interested in seeing what policies are up for review each term. The new Education Outside the Classroom policies and procedures were implemented at the start of this year. Thank you to everyone who has been involved in implementing these new procedures. A lot of work went into making these robust. We have ERO visiting the school in November and have prepared for their visit over the last few terms.

At our last meeting we farewelled Angus Putt who has been our student representative on the board for the past 12 months. Angus has been a valued member of the board and we appreciate his contributions. We now welcome Daniel Fletcher to the board as the new student rep for the next 12 months.

During the year we farewelled Louise Berney the School executive officer due to her relocating out of town. Louise sat on the property committee and also provided the finance report for each board meeting. We were very fortunate that she was able to extend her notice period and have a handover period with her replacement Alice Wichman as it took some time to find the right person for this role.

At the end of last year we co-opted Kelley Samuels-Hema onto the board as our lwi representative for three years. Thank you Kelley for your contribution this year and also to all of the other board members. Thank you for the roles you hold on the sub-committees and the contribution you make.

To those sitting exams over the next few weeks – good luck. And farewell to those students leaving our Kura. All the best with your future endeavours.


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Our School LIBRARY

Whakarewa.




INTEGRATED LEARNING



Students learnt about exciting developments in the world of food. A variety of skills were taught in the practical room with students getting the opportunity to design, develop and cook a range of good foods. Students identified nutritional needs and adapted recipes to meet those needs. They identified what nutrients are in a product (food label) and learnt to understand how it fits with an individual's dietary needs.

YEAR 10

Students learnt about the exciting world of food product development which involved researching, designing, developing and evaluating food outcomes. This involved researching, designing, developing and evaluating their food product while understanding the importance of materials and process selection for performance, aesthetics, and sustainability.

YEAR 12 + 13

Our hospitality technology classes have been busy with various exciting projects. While gaining experience in the hospitality industry, students have been learning transferable skills and qualities while practising food safety methods in the kitchen. They produced some delicious baking that provided them with experience to enrol in a Polytechnic and gain further qualifications or the skills to enter the local hospitality industry.

Co-Ordinator.

This year we had two 11 Explore classes, one 12 LTW class, one 12 Drivers Education class and our new 13 Hub. Students have had some wonderful opportunities on their courses and the Hub has been a successful initiative.

Gateway has had another huge year with 70 students having work experience placements. Thanks to Nicola Thomsen, our Gateway Co-Ordinator, who works tirelessly to find employers to host our students on Gateway placements. These experiences are so vital for making those "Life Beyond School" choices. This would not be able to happen without the huge support we get from our community and local businesses. Our employers are incredibly generous and just keep on hosting our students. A huge thank you to the businesses that supported us this year.

The Futures Academy gives students a head start, gaining specific and practical experience and skills in an industry-based setting, and the opportunity to move directly into a job, apprenticeship, or further study, on completion of secondary school. Students in our Hub course have been enrolled in the following trades courses: Electrical Pre-Trade Foundation; Construction; Automotive Engineering; Farming & Agriculture; Cooking and Culinary Arts and Make-up and Skin Care.


Our Year 10 to Year 13 students attended the Careers Roadshow this year. The aim of the day was for students to have the opportunity to talk face to face with the widest range of employers, industry, government departments and training providers. This will help them with their future pathways and subject selection. Thank you to Taupo Pathways for organising the event.

Our Year 12 and Year 13 students visited MB Century, GNS Science, Mercury and Contact Energy as part of Geothermal Week to explore different careers in the industry.

Taupo Pathways Connect Programme connects our students in Year 11 with employers in the Taupo District. Students had the opportunity to visit one of the following: Corbie Films; Sign On, MB Century; TDX; Pāmu; Pinnacle Health; Police; Fire; AC Baths; Cargill Stent & Clarke Lawyers; DPA Chartered Accountants; David's Excellence in Hair; Diamond Laser Medispa; Classic Builders and some Tūwharetoa businesses such as Opepe Farms, Chris Jolly and Hole in One. This enabled our students to expand their knowledge of what careers are available, help them form a career pathway and be better equipped to make informed decisions.

Thanks to all the tertiary providers, Whakapiki Ake, the NZDF, Taupo Pathways, Hauora Taiwhenua Rural Health Network and guest speakers who came into the school to provide our students with information and support for their future pathways. Thank you to all the students who have worked with us in Careers, Gateway and the Futures Academy and for the inspiring conversations we have been part of. Finally, thank you to the Vocational Pathways Team for the extra support provided to our students to enable them to experience success and have the opportunities afforded them.







So the South Waikato community of school-players took the 'Bard's' advice and got together at the end of term 1 to celebrate the SGCNZ UOSW Shakespeare Festival.

As the host school, Taupō-nui-a-Tia entered two student-directed 5-minute entries and two 15-minute teacher-directed entries. Year 13 students directed a modern take on Much Ado About Nothing (from the set of "Love Island"!) and a year 12 student used Romeo & Juliet to highlight how today's "boyz" feel about romance. The 15-minute entries were a modern take on King Lear (set in a private grammar school) and an examination of the competitive nature of NZ sports teams on tournament week in Troilus & Cressida.

The festival assessors were two talented dramatists from across the motu, and our college's Troilus & Cressida extract won best scene, and therefore the opportunity to perform at the National Festival in Wellington at King's Birthday Weekend

Meanwhile, our very own head boy, Oscar McDougall was selected as 'direct entry' to the NSSP (basically a 'best' acting award from the region).

NSSP is the national schools Shakespeare production week which is 10 days of working with professional directors to perform for a 50% chance of being selected for a trip to London's Globe Theatre. King's birthday weekend saw two vans, packed full of set, excited cast, crew and Oscar heading to the Nationals for 5 days of workshops, performances and adventure. We had massive amounts of fun with much laughing, socialising and overcoming some huge challenges to create memories and friendships for life.

2024 was an adventurous year for the Drama Whānau at TNT! There were new level one NCEA standards to conquer, new ways of doing things to embrace and new scripts to learn; all of which created lots of opportunities to sharpen our ability to be flexible, adaptable and resilient.

The "Ugly Shakespeare Company" travelling theatre players came to visit and delivered a rollicking, modern take on Shakespeare's "Macbeth".

Proof of creative problem-solving abounded in our department and was highlighted in talented performances at every year level: from year 9's learning to shape Māori creation kōrero using drama conventions, to the year 10s enthusiastic productions of Greek Theatre and their first taste of learning lines, to our live shows from the senior drama courses.

Not only that, but we hosted the SGCNZ UOSW South Waikato Regional Shakespeare Festival again in April, which saw us win a place at the National Festival in Wellington.

At year 11 Kiwis Come Out at Night is the first live performance many drama students partake in, and is also their first dip into what it's like being on stage; extracts are rehearsed, learned and performed in front of a real audience. This year we joined the year 11 music students and focused on a couple of scenes from Jean Betts' kiwi, feminist version of Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream called, Revenge of the Amazons.

In 2024 the year 12 and 13 drama students also took up the wero of performance, except this time in the production of a full play. We traced our kiwi whakapapa back through some pretty strong Irish DNA (and some hilarious Irish accents) back to the 1800s to tell the story of Irish Annals of Aotearoa, by Simon O'Connor (adapted from the novel by Michael O'Leary). This was a combined level performance assessment, and took place over two excellent nights of laughter and tears.







It has been another great year for our Physical Education students. Throughout the year our students have the opportunity to participate in a variety of sporting activities, such as volleyball, turbo touch, european handball, just to name a few. Alongside, they deepen their knowledge and understanding of a wide range of biophysical principles, through designing and implementing a training programme and skill development.

However, the Papamoa Leadership camp continues to be the highlight of the year, where Mr Barlow and Mrs Walker travelled to the Christian Campsite for 2 nights. The student planned and ran a number of ABL activities, surf lessons, and games - ultimate frisbee, volleyball and diamond cricket for approximately 65 Intermediate students. Teamwork was the key for all their activities as they were not only challenged to develop their own leadership skills but to inspire new leaders within their groups. 
