PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Tinei Te mihi nui

Kia Koutou Katoa

It is my pleasure to present the annual report for 2021.

Last year when delivering this report, my opening statement was about the disruption caused by the world-wide pandemic and how the college responded to an unprecedented event called a "lock-down". Sadly, this term has become common parlance in our society with 2021 seeing this country and in turn this community being held hostage by the Covid-19 Delta virus.

This year the lead into the Alert Level 4 lockdown was extremely short and I would like to commend our senior managers, teaching staff and support staff for responding to this in such a professional manner. Our students were well served with the support and guidance they received from our staff, including in some cases door to door delivery of devices.

In stating the above there is no denying that the Covid lock downs continue to have an adverse effect on the academic, cultural, and sporting life of the college. This highlights the importance of individual and organizational wellbeing. Wellbeing is one of the key strands in our strategic plan and this term the college has started to work with the New Zealand Institute of Wellbeing and Resilience on a 'whole-school' wellbeing programme. A growing body of literature suggests wellbeing education programmes can have a positive impact on the way many students 'know and understand' themselves, their peers, and their families. Studies have also demonstrated that students with higher levels of wellbeing are more resilient, perform better academically, report higher levels of self-control and lower levels of procrastination.

Whole-school wellbeing not only involves students but teachers, the senior leadership team, support staff the board of trustees and parents and families of students. While this is a big undertaking the national and local statistics regarding mental health make grim reading and, in my opinion, it is vital that this college focuses on supporting the wellbeing of all its stakeholders.

This year has seen some significant changes in education that will be rolled out over the next few years. This includes the NCEA Change Programme, the Tomorrow's Schools Reforms, and the National Curriculum Refresh. I am aware that for many people they would like to wake up one morning and all these changes had happened, and they had skipped the painful parts. Unfortunately, this is not the case, and the reality is all schools in this country will have to come to the realisation that they can no longer operate the way they have in the past and their curriculums and structures and systems will have to change. As author Kelly Morgan states, "Changes are inevitable and not always controllable. What can be controlled is how to manage, react to and work through the change process." I am confident Taupo nui-a-TiaCollege has the capacity to embrace these changes for the benefit of students now and in the future. This has been confirmed by our evaluation partner from the Education Review Office who indicated our review and evaluation processes, and outcomes are some of the best she has seen among all the schools ERO covers in this region.

Our NCEA results continue to compare favourably with schools around the country. Worthy of mention is the NCEA Level 2 achievement of our Māori students who had a pass rate of 90%. While this is commendable there is still work to be done to ensure we are meeting our obligations under Tiriti o Waitangi in all aspects of school life. As a principal, I want to see all students of Taupo nui-a-TiaCollege leaving this school equipped to take on the challenges life throws at them and with as many choices as possible.

Over the last two decades we have seen the influence the internet has had in education. Our students now have access to an abundance of knowledge from around the globe. This means students no longer must just learn and retain knowledge but be equipped with the skills to find, analyse, and evaluate information to help them make their own connections. The use of IT has also provided schools with a range of online learning tools that have enhanced classroom teaching.

While the benefits of information technology are manifold in education, ready access to the internet also comes with some challenges, both to individuals, the school, and the wider community. We live in an age where social media is commonplace in everyone's lives. While social media platforms were designed to be sites to help people connect, a darker side to these sites has developed. Misinformation, innuendo, and conspiracy theories have gone unchallenged and believed by large sections of the population and if repeated often enough are taken as facts. Research has shown that anger, violence, and hate generate greater online activity that serve to generate

more revenue from sponsors with no concern for people on the receiving end of such vitriol. I call it the "age of outrage" where people feel they have the right to go online, often without knowing all the facts, if any at all and put the boot in! Our challenge as a school is to ensure face to face interactions are still valued as the best way to communicate. We also need to view a student's ability to identify misinformation as a critical literacy as they cannot navigate the world safely without these skills.

The cultural side of life continues to thrive in the college. Music, dance, kapa haka and drama in the school has provided an avenue for a wide range of students to develop their talents. In all disciplines, we have students performing at the highest level provincially, nationally and in the case of drama the international stage. We are fortunate to have some very talented staff members to nurture our students in all areas of the Arts.

Despite another disjointed season, sport has continued to flourish in the school. As with other years we have individual students and teams achieving national titles in a range of sports. I would like to thank all our coaches and managers for the time they put into supporting our sports men and women.

I would like to conclude by talking about our staff and students. Firstly, thanks must go to the senior managers - Brenda Ronke, Alistair Froggett, Richard Murphy, and Stephen Fowler. Special mention needs to be made of Alistair Froggett who ably led the school in the role of Acting Principal during my sabbatical leave this year. All our senior managers have individual strengths that combine well with the multitude of tasks they undertake. We are lucky to have them, and I appreciate the work they do. A welcome addition to the senior management team during term 3 was Maria Heaslip who stepped in as Acting Deputy Principal and did a sterling job.

I would also like to thank the deans for caring for the pastoral and academic needs of our students while still meeting their responsibilities in the classroom. The professionalism and collegiality amongst this group is a genuine strength in this school.

Taupo nui-a-TiaCollege has always been blessed with very competent and supportive boards and this year has been no exception. I would like to thank board chair Kevin Insley and the board for always having the interests of students and staff at the forefront of their decision making. We are fortunate to have a range of expertise on our board including the considerable experience of Lorraine Kerr who has served on our board for close to 30 years.

To all our staff - I applaud you for the work you do every day and on occasions late into the night! The skills you have in communicating, listening, collaborating, adapting, empathising coupled with bucketloads of patience should never be taken for granted. This school is fortunate to have so many excellent practitioners who give their best for our students. These people are well backed up by our support staff who always keep things running smoothly.

This year three staff are retiring Raewyn Ireland, Yvonne Orr, and Aruna Singh. Raewyn leaves us after 25 years of teaching Japanese in the college. Raewyn, I thank you for your service to the school and the passion you have shown for your subject. I wish you the very best with your retirement. Yvonne leaves the college having taught in the Social Science Faculty for 12 years. Yvonne, no doubt your mountain bike will be getting plenty of use as you make the most of this district's wonderful environment. Aruna is our longest serving Teacher Aide and I thank her for the work she has done with our students who have needed extra support. Also leaving is Stephen Parker, who will be taking up a position at Waikato Diocesan next year. Toni Thomsen leaves us this year to take up a position as Head of English at Te Aute College and I know she will add value to the young men at that school. And last but not least - The principal's PA Julz Satherley has left to take up a position in another school. Julz made a significant contribution to the school during her time at the college and she will be sorely missed.

To our Head Students - you all have different personalities that have complemented each other well. You have done a great job under trying circumstances and I thank you for your contribution to the life of the college.

To all of our Year 13 students, despite the lockdown, disruptions and constant postponements and cancellations you have got on with it and made the very best of your final year at college. As you will see this afternoon there is a lot of talent in this group.

I hope you leave Taupo nui-a-TiaCollege with fond memories, and I wish you the very best for the future.

And finally, I have tendered my resignation as Principal of Taupo nui-a-TiaCollege to the Board Chair to take up a position as a Principal Adviser in the Bay of Plenty and Waikato region in 2022. It has been an honour and a privilege to have led this school over the last 15 years. This school has always been blessed with good Boards, fantastic staff, wonderful students, and a positive school culture. Taupo nui-a-TiaCollege has a well-deserved reputation around the country for producing positive outcomes for its students and having a great heart. I will leave this school secure in the knowledge that it will continue to thrive.

I wish the Board, staff, and students of this fine institution the very best for the future.

Farewell MR MOYLE



Peter Moyle joined the staff of Taupo nui-a-Tia College as a newly-minted Deputy Principal at the end of Term 1, 1997. He came to us from Waihi College, where he was a successful and innovative Head of Department. His primary and secondary education had taken place in Taumarunui, where his father, Terry Moyle, was a justly famous Principal of Taumarunui High School for many years. So, Peter was returning to his roots in the Volcanic Plateau/King Country area of Aotearoa.

Ten years later, Graeme Ryan (the then-Principal) retired at the end of Term 3, 2007. After going through a necessarily arduous and searching selection process, Peter won the Principal's appointment and has been in the top job for fourteen years. He and Jos have now decided that it is time to move on to the next phase of his career, and it is with thanks for all they have done that we bid them farewell.

Peter has one unvarying focus, and that is that the school and staff exist for the betterment of the students. Young people have only one shot at being teenagers, and Peter believes that the key task of any school is to help and guide them through these turbulent years. With this in mind, it is helpful to consider one or two innovations that Peter encouraged. He invented Spirit Week at Nui. We used to have heavy student absenteeism every year during the last week of Term 2. Peter brought an idea across from Waihi College and initiated a three day festival of inter-house fun and competition for the last days of Term 2. This caught on very quickly and absenteeism fell to almost zero. A week of boredom and winding down was transformed into a week of celebration, and everybody benefitted. Similarly, but in a different area, he encouraged the development of a stand-alone course for capable Year 9 and 10 students to stretch their mental outreach and reasoning skills. He encouraged the school to resource this course properly, and we named it The Enhanced Learning Programme, ELP for short. It ran very successfully from 1999-2018, nearly 20 years, and ex-students still speak of the benefit they received from it.

Peter believes that values are fundamental to the development of young people, and he encouraged Nui to become involved in the Cornerstone Values movement. After working hard with the way the school was organised, and with the staff and the students, we were accredited as a Cornerstone Values school. This means that the key cornerstone values of any civilised society are actively taught and modelled, and is another example of the way Peter puts the students at the heart of what we do.

Peter has been a Principal who is thoughtful and considered in all that he does. He is not prone to hasty decisions, and is not easily swayed until he is convinced of the wisdom of a course of action. He is kind, and realises that there is more than one solution to every problem. He is not linear in his thinking, and considers that diversity is not a fault but a virtue. He surrounds himself with capable people, and doesn't fail to listen to them and to draw on their experience and wisdom.

We are sorry to see Peter and Jos leave us, but we are thankful for their contribution to Nui over the last twenty-three years. The quality of the Principal has a profound effect over time on the quality of a school, and Peter Moyle has not let us down. Farewell and best wishes, you will not be forgotten.

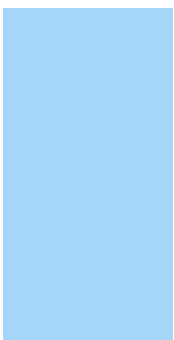














Casey Thorby

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KAPA HAKA

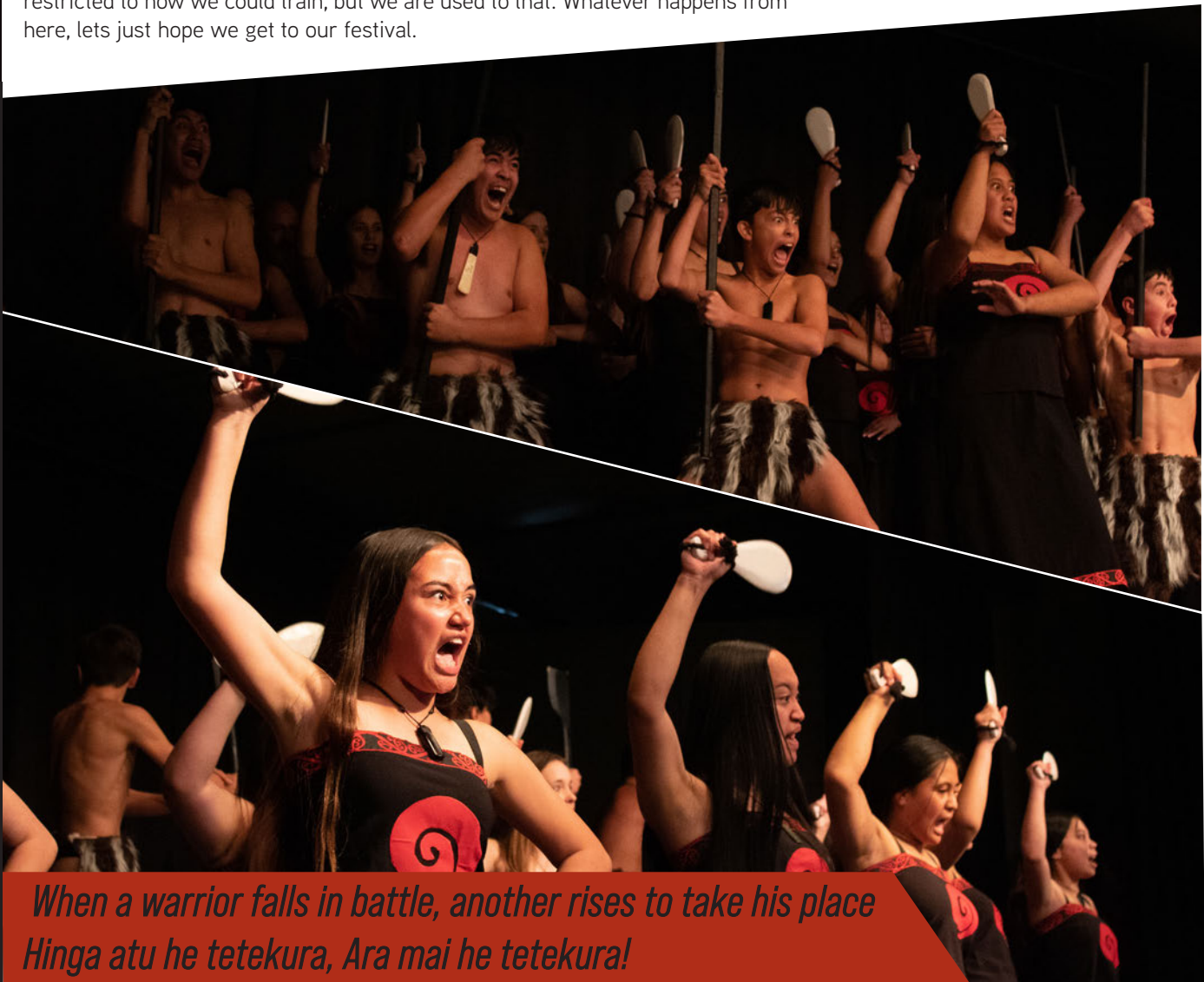

Things were slowly coming together.

2021 was also the year of the dreaded, but famous, Te Arawa regionals; where the best secondary schools kapa haka groups come together to battle it out and then progress on to the Nationals. The current National Champions (Raukura) are from our region so the standard is incredibly high. As we developed, so did the pressure of expectation, of performance standard, both from our tutors and even ourselves.

Every group needs a reality check and this came with dress rehearsals; a real eye-opener and a reality check for those who weren't really up to standard. A couple of hit-outs at junior and senior assemblies helped, but some students take a little longer than others to get there. Finally, the day had come; the regionals. The trip to Rotorua initially went well, the prep and buildup were surprisingly smooth and things seemed real good; until we arrived backstage and the nerves hit! In the end, the team performed to a reasonable standard; but not where we had hoped, but hey, this is Te Arawa.

Much can be said of experience and this is one of those times. The brave have learned (the hard way) and will be the better for it. They have performed in front of their school twice now and have been requested to perform for other local schools as well. We can only hope that they will rise to the occasion and honor their name and reputation. Then... Covid struck again in September and plans to attend the Mana Ariki festival went down the drain. The Tuwharetoa festival was postponed until November and training resumed with a few more personnel changes. At the time of writing, under Covid rules, we were restricted to how we could train, but we are used to that. Whatever happens from here, lets just hope we get to our festival.

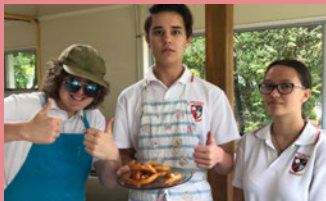
Spanish Immersion Day

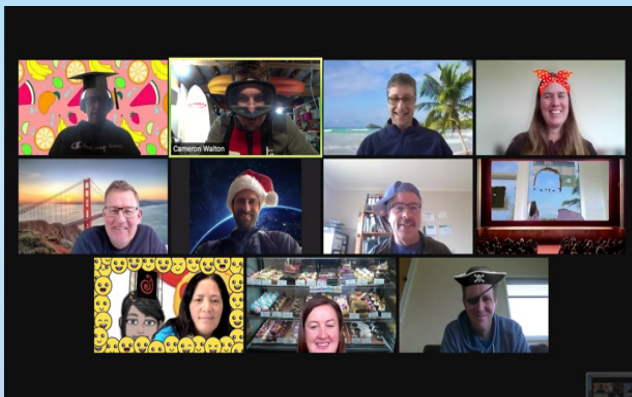


+ - MATHS ÷ ×

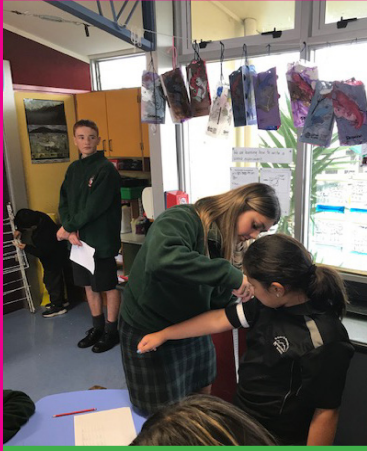


HOSPITALITY

FASHION TECH 2021

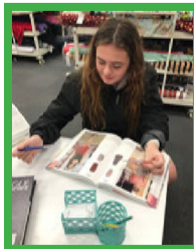
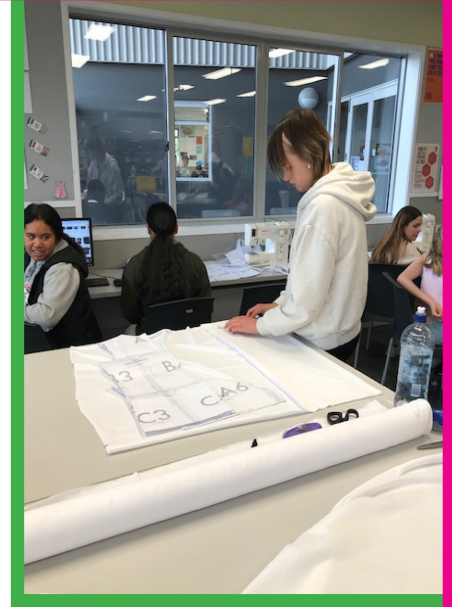
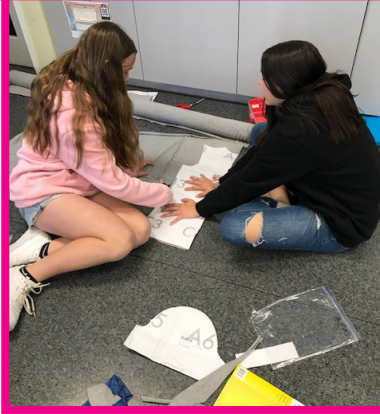

2021 continued to be a booming year in Fashion and Textiles Technology with the number of classes continuing to grow. We were really lucky to introduce another textiles teacher - Mrs Smith - to our department. Together we all journeyed into the world of textiles, screen printing on hoodies, fast-fashion, design and, not to forget, improving our practical sewing skills. Being able to sew is a skill that will set you up for life and opens up opportunities to have side hustles to make some money. Our junior projects have varied from making boomerang bags, to bucket hats, to pj shorts, to t-shirts with individual vinyl designs, to going to the op shop and upcycling a \$3 item. Our seniors have worked on a variety of projects including a sustainability project where we have to come up with a way to combat fast-fashion, making individualised hoodies, skater skirts, crop tops, bikini tops, tailored trousers and overnight duffel bags. We really are having a blast and producing outcomes that we are proud of. See you in 2022 and all that it has to offer - bring it on!!!!



During semester 1, the Year 9 DVC class learned a number of different skills. These included how to create geometry for the laser cutter, where students created some “Wall Art” using a variety of materials. An extension of these skills saw the class designing personal logos which we cut out with the vinyl cutter and then ironed onto tee shirts using our new heat press.

Following on from that project, we then learned about the design process and created a virtual model rocket in Fusion 360. We also created physical models - some of which were 3D printed- which we were going to launch, but a combination of bad weather and a rapidly approaching end of term meant that we did not get to fly these. The semester 2 DVC class has been exploring similar projects as well as learning about designing a ‘transportable office’ and modelling this in SketchUp.

The Year 10 classes, working with Mr Kemsley-Smith, extended their knowledge in design. They created technology art projects inspired by the personal interests of students; everything from models of Big Ben in London to a Wall Light inspired by Disneyland’s castle.

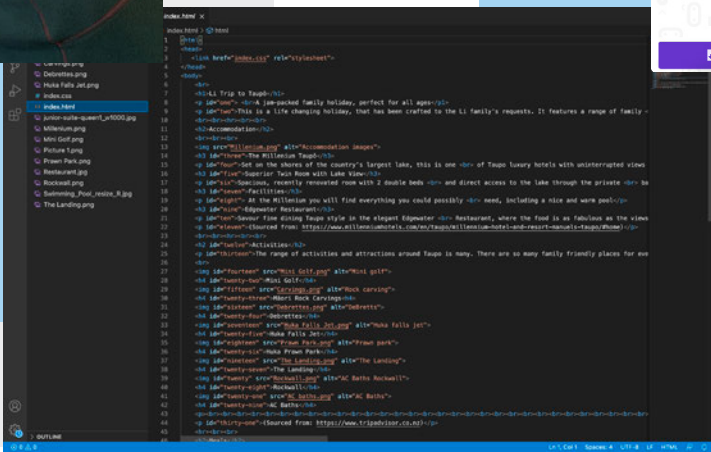
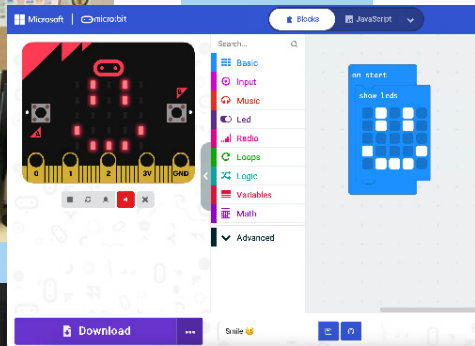
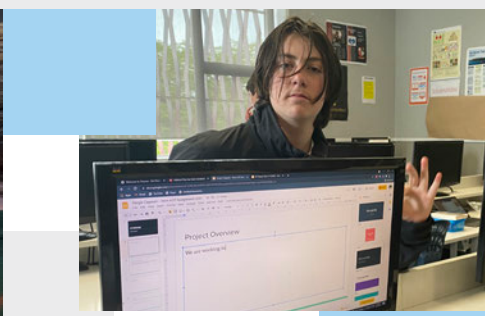
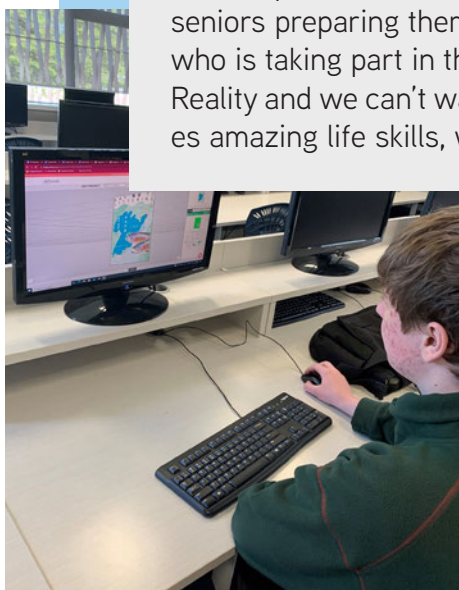
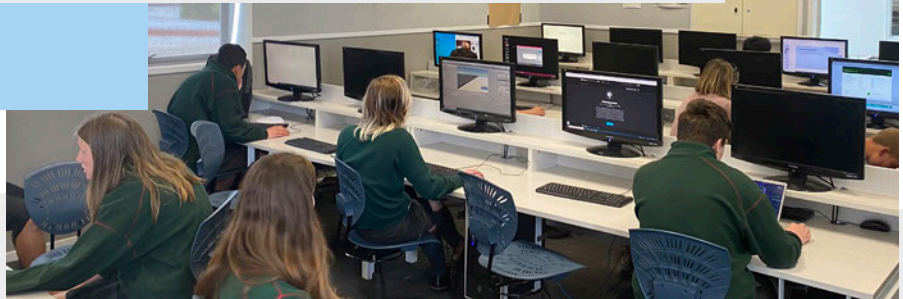
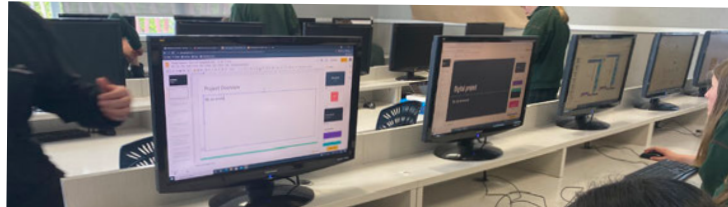

DT is all about using digital systems to create ideas and information, and to define, design and implement digital solutions. Over the past two semesters, each year level has undertaken exciting missions, such as year 9s taking part in The Great NZ Histories Student Game Design Competition (congratulations to Victor Marion who came 1st place), year 10s designing databases, spreadsheets, html webpages and coding microbits in innovative ways, and seniors preparing themselves for NCEA exams. Also, a shout out to Vincent Hall who is taking part in the 123Tech Challenge this year, he is working with Virtual Reality and we can't wait to see his project! DT is an awesome subject that teaches amazing life skills, we can't wait to see what next year brings.



Resistant Materials & Wood

Our Year 11 and 12 students have been hard at work participating in a mixture of achievement standard and unit standard projects. For the Year 11's, this was creating a wooden tray to a set of plans and using specific skills like a dove tail and housed joints. This also included designing and making a piece of furniture of their choice to 'organise their lives' following the design process.



For the Year 12's, this consisted of them finding a client and manufacturing a furniture product to the clients needs, using working drawings that they created. Their first project, a hall mirror, is where the students were required to make the item from a standard set of plans and skills like rebating joints and mortise.

The major project for the Year 12's was to make a piece of furniture, with the brief stating that it had to be some sort of table. This project required students to be competent in the use of portable power tools and adding finishes to be able to produce a quality product to a high standard.



The students have again surprised me with the wonderful ideas they can come up with every year. They have produced some very nice design work, which has been supported by some great practical project work. - John Thiele

Trades, Carpentry & Joinery

2021 has been another very busy year for students completing our Year 13 Trades Carpentry course. They worked as a team with leadership roles to complete both the theoretical and practical industrial Unit Standards from BCITO that are on offer.

As part of this course, students completed the construction of two pre-sold buildings/sleepouts (4.2m x 2.3m). Students also had to design a porch and veranda attachment to the front, which was constructed with all the relevant building code requirements. The units were then pre-sold to local residents or businesses in the Taupō area for a reasonable price.

At the end of the course, students will work with the tools required to build a foundation, assemble wall framing and roofing, apply weather proofing materials, wall claddings, aluminium joinery, roof claddings and flashings. They will learn about the tools, materials, safety, and first aid. This sort of programme would be very difficult to run without the marvellous support (some for many years now) from people and our own Taupō community businesses like Tenon Ltd (Ross Johanson & Darryl Robinson), Mike Prior Saw Milling Ltd (Mike Prior), Bunning's (Nikki McLeod), Vistalite Taupō (Ross Harve), Roofing Industries (Adam Cribb), Hynds (Darryl Watson).

It has been very interesting for me to see how well the students have coped with applying the new building information and techniques that they have been introduced to so far this year.

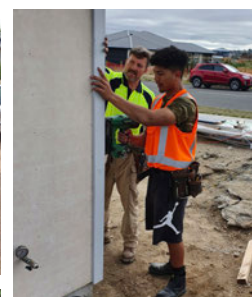

TRADES ACADEMY

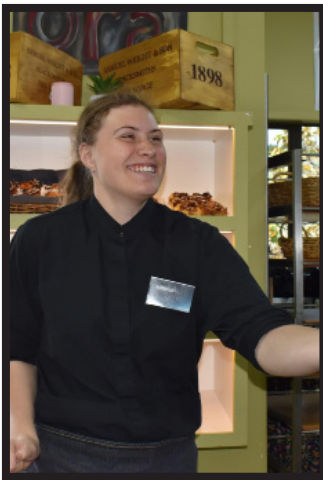

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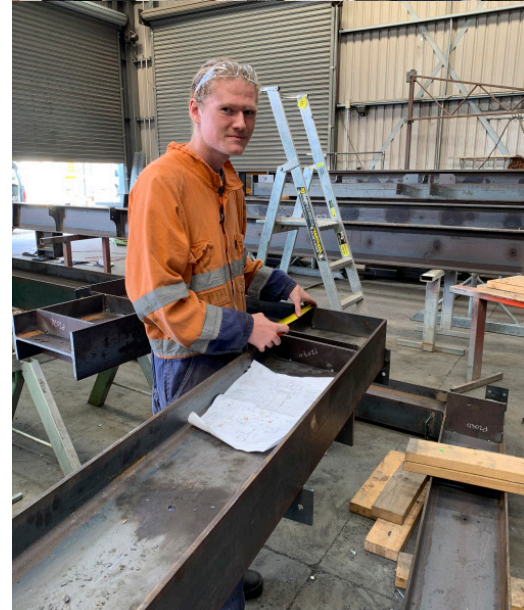
GATEWAY

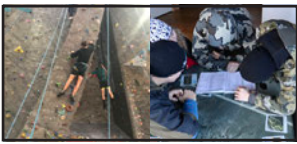




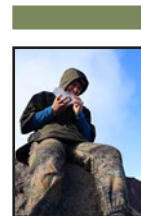
OUTDOOR EDUCATION
